NEW COUNCILMAN FLIEGEL SPEAKER AT KIWANIS MEET

J. F. Fliegel, attorney and new member of the city council, was the main speaker this noon at the regular luncheon of the Kiwanis club, telling of a recent trip to Salem, where he attended a convention of the League of Oregon Cities.

Fliegel said the league presents a unified front before the state legislature, having held district meetings to air the problems of the state before they are shaped into legislation. He outlined four measures before the legislature that are of interest to the city of Medford. First he said the Knox bill is believed satisfactory, with the exception of the beer clause, remedies for which are being considered.

Regarding the bill for interest in assessments, Fliegel said the present law favors the county on delinquent payments to the detriment of cities, which under the present law receive no interest.

Regarding gas tax consumption, Fliegel said that such vehicles as street sweepers and fire trucks pay the gas tax like any other car. He said he believes it will be hard to secure exemption, but that legislators expect to effect a compromise with the highway department to leave the present setup alone and in return secure highway construction on major highways within the city limits.

Fliegel said the bill for civil service for fire departments is a controversial issue not being favored by the smaller communities.

SPRING GRADUATES ADDED TO WORRIES OF NAZI OFFICIALS

BERLIN (AP)—What to do with 600,000 young Germans who will complete secondary school courses next spring presents a problem that Nazi labor and youth leaders already are worrying about.

So many thousands of recent graduates have been sent to farms for "land year" or to labor camps that these possibilities for paring unemployment lists virtually are exhausted.

In an appeal signed by Leaders Hecker, Ley, von Schirach, and Syrup, chiefs respectively of the Reich economics chamber, labor front, youth movement and labor insurance office, a campaign is forecast whereby employers will be forced to take apprentices into their service.

The manifesto gives the assurance that the boys and girls will be faithful learners and workers, and says: "Make room in your businesses on April 1, 1935, for as many apprentices as you can. The preparation of the young generation is not a burden but an opportunity for serving the whole German people and economic structure."

Besides the secondary school graduates, 100,000 will emerge from scientific and higher institutions.

Some of them will be sent to highway and canal gangs, but the prospect is that not a few of them, trained for legal, scientific or other professional careers, will have as their first jobs sweeping out offices.

FRENCH AIRMEN TO TRY AGAIN

PORTO PRAIA, Cape Verde Islands, Feb. 18.—(AP)—Undaunted by failure of their first effort to set a new non-stop flight distance record, Paul Codos and Maurice Roast will try again as soon as they get back to France.

The fliers tinkered with their engine of the "Joseph LeBrix," their four-year-old plane, to determine the cause of the failure of its oil pumping mechanism.
