SENATE PERMITS BILLS TO ROT IS HAMILTON'S CLAIM

with the county unit all fees collected. The other places all collected by departments, boards or commissions in the general fund. It was passed by the house January 31 and referred to the senate committee on January 1. The county school unit bill will get consideration under special order of business Wednesday afternoon.

SALEM, Feb. 19.—(AP)—Both houses of the Oregon legislature today continued consideration of major issues after definitely placing in the archives the attempt to inject the "cocktail" amendment to the Oregon liquor control act. The bill was defeated last yesterday by a 41 to 19 vote.

The house started on the four anti-organized labor measures, all of which were outgrowths of the longshoremen's strike this summer. One would repeal the anti-injunction suits in labor troubles, while another would permit interference by state police in treatment of strikes.

Train Bill Near
Following the labor measures the house had scheduled the 70-car train bill, also put over as the result of the long fight over the liquor measure. The senate was expected to consider the divided reports on the county unit system of public education, an administration measure, but when the 4 to 3 adverse report came out it was placed on special order for 2:30 p. m. tomorrow.

The debate on the "cocktail" bill was opened by Representative Howard Latourette of Portland, who defended the minority report of the committee which favored its passage. The committee vote was five to four against. Mrs. Nanny Wood Honeyman, likewise of Portland, led the opposition forces.

Speakeasies Florida
Proponents of the cocktail measure declared the purpose of the state liquor law was to control alcoholic liquor and raise revenue, but that if it failed because of denying the serving of drinks by the glass, and as a result "speakeasies" were found any where in cities.

Opponents of the measure declared that if the bars were let down to serving by the glass, as urged by hotel and restaurant owners, it would bring back the saloon and as a result would place Oregon again in the dry column.

Bar Governor Proposed
The completed act of the legislature providing for regulating the practice of law was signed by Governor Martin on February 14 and late yesterday the first nomination for governor of the Oregon bar association under this law was filed with the clerk of the supreme court. Eugene K. Oppenheimer of Portland was placed in nomination by petition of 12 attorneys from Portland, the third congressional district. The new law (senate bill 103) directs that three governors be elected from each congressional district and nominations are made upon petitions from attorneys in each district filed with the clerk of the supreme court. The first election for the governors will take place within 60 to 90 days after the law goes into effect, which will bring it some time in August.

JOB INSURANCE IN BRITAIN TOPIC OF ROTARY SPEAKER

William Bayliss, who recently came to the United States from England, discussed Great Britain's unemployment insurance plan, which has attracted universal attention during the last few months, at a luncheon meeting of the Medford Rotary club today in the basement banquet hall of the Hotel Medford. The speaker reviewed economic conditions in his country, including the industrial revolution which brought about the need for a business-like plan to cope with increasingly frequent depression periods and pointed out the good points and fallacies in England's present insurance system.

The state insurance plan in England was originally started for health benefits only, Mr. Bayliss said. In 1931, with increasing need for a more comprehensive plan to cope with mounting unemployment, the business side of an insurance plan was considered to put it on a self-supporting basis, taking the place of state grants. The result was the unemployment insurance act of 1934. Mr. Bayliss' brother, Mr. Fred Bayliss, and Mr. Black of Hill, were guests at today's luncheon.

An entertaining musical feature preceded the speaker's talk, in which Mary Ann Gava, Mary Kern, Olaf Severson, and Billy Wilson, presented two musical numbers from the high school opera, "Chimes of Normandy," which will be held at the high school auditorium, February 26th and 27th. Mrs. Esther Leake supervised these numbers, and they were accompanied by Dorothy Burgess.

Dr. Eddie Durno, who heads the Jackson county chamber of commerce committee for raising funds to send the Southern Oregon Normal basketball team to the A. A. U. tournament in Denver next month, spoke briefly of the plans of his committee and urged a generous attendance at the benefit game Thursday evening at the high school gymnasium between the Sons and the Union Oil team of Portland.
