

BOURBONS STIRRED BY HOOVER'S PLEA FOR GOLD RETURN

was one of the first to advocate devaluation of the dollar, started the senate discussion by contending Mr Hoover was proposing to return to the system that "brought his administration tumbling in ruins about him."

Glass, a conservative Virginia Democrat, who has been critical of new deal monetary policies, listened in silence at first, but finally leaped to his feet to challenge the Texan and charge.

"We are on a flat currency basis and following the decision of the supreme court on a flat gold basis," Connally said the supreme court had answered Glass.

"No, it hasn't answered me," Glass retorted. "The court said that what was written on those notes was a cheat and a repudiation and has said that in spite of this great cheat and repudiation if a holder of a note undertakes to get what is due him he can go to hell."

While the debate waged warmly on the floor, Democrats in their comments outside the chamber contended Mr Hoover's proposal was "impossible," while Republicans mostly were silent.

DELINQUENT TAX PAYMENTS MADE

Payments of delinquent taxes for the years 1930, 1931 and 1932 are "fairly brisk," according to the tax collection department of the sheriff's office. The payments are on the property for the most part against which the county recently served notice of tax foreclosure proceedings.

Receipts issued for taxes for the current year to date total 251, and this is above the number for last year. Interest payments on current taxes for the first quarter are due after March 15. The tax paying for the current year is not expected to assume any proportions until after March 1.

BUTTER ADVANCES HALF CENT POUND

PORTLAND, Feb. 21.—(AP)—Butter showed an advance of 1/2 cent per lb. on the produce exchange for the late session although this was more sentimental than actual, insofar as indicating strength of the market.

The late erratic trend of prices, sharp declines following the previous spirited advances, has completely upset the trade.

Butterfat was advanced 1/2 lb. officially but this was a mere gesture as most of the operators were paying the higher prices for several days.

Market for eggs generally showed a steady tone locally and no change of moment was shown in prices overnight. Receipts continued to reflect increase.

Trading in the chicken market continued of steady character and with full prices held generally at country points and for Portland delivery. Best call remained for medium weight Leghorns.
