

## RADIO TELEPHONE FOR AUTOMOBILES SEEN ON HORIZON

BERKELEY, Cal.—(UP) The youthful electrical wizard who equipped Berkeley's "scientific police department" with radio and who provided 22 launches, ground stations and towing piers of the San Francisco-Oakland Bay bridge with radio telephones believes it won't be long until automobile radiophones are commonplace.

He is 22-year-old D. Reginald Tibbets, who designed and installed for the bay bridge engineering companies four complete high-frequency radio telephone systems.

Head by Experts  
He explained his projects to the nation's foremost electrical authorities recently at the 25th convention of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers in Salt Lake City. Six years ago, at 16, he provided Berkeley's police department with the first police radio system. He did the job in time taken from high school studies.

A runner-up in the Edison Intelligence competition, Tibbets tells interviewers: "There's really nothing to it," as he spins the dials of his compact radio-telephone.

The telephone employs standard receivers and transmitters connected to a box resembling an ordinary radio receiving set. Special tubes and other standard equipment complete the unit. Six foot aluminum rods are the antenna. The radio telephones operate on a 4 to 6 meter wave length, compared to the 300 to 1500 meter wave lengths used by broadcasting stations.

Licensing Trouble  
Difficulty arose over licensing 800 people who would have used the 22 bridge phone sets. The issue was compromised after 234 had passed examinations for federal radio operator licenses. Candidates memorized answers and answered other technical questions in some such manner: "I would pull the switch and call the office."

Tibbets now is the only licensed operator. From his shop, he can tune in any of the sets and suggest adjustments of wave lengths or other adjustments for clearer transmission.

## IRELAND TO OPEN DETERMINED DRIVE UPON SMUGGLERS

DUBLIN.—(UP)—Smugglers on the uneasy border between the Irish Free State and Northern Ireland are promised a hot time of it as a result of an intensive drive which the Free State government is likely to launch against them soon.

The drive was foreshadowed when the Free State customs authorities purchased 16 chaser automobiles to patrol the whole frontier from Carrlingford Lough in the east to Lough Foyle on the northern coast.

In times past the customs "flying squads" were equipped with nothing speedier than bicycles, while many smugglers owned fast automobiles.

Smugglers, who enter the Free State from the north by forbidden routes, now are faced with the prospect of being chased by customs squads in cars quite as fast as their own.

Smuggling across the northern frontier is believed to have increased considerably in the past year, largely owing to the higher duties imposed by both the Free State and Great Britain in the course of the Anglo-Irish trade war.

Northern Ireland is included in the United Kingdom customs area, and has consequently developed into a "base" for smuggling operations over the Free State border.

Illicit cattle-running from the Irish Free State into Northern Ireland has also greatly increased in recent months owing to the high duties imposed by the British government on cattle from the Free State.

## BUTTER WEAKENED BY ACCUMULATION

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 22.—At least seventeen thoroughbreds were burned to death, another injured so badly he may have to be destroyed and a stable hand was hurt in a fire that swept through a barn at the fairgrounds race track here late last night causing damage estimated between \$60,000 and \$75,000.

## DOLLAR VALUE UP IN LONDON MART

LONDON, Feb. 22.—(AP)—The United States dollar celebrated Washington's birthday today by moving beyond its old party, gaining 1½ cents to the pound, and closing at 4.86 5-16 to the pound as compared with yesterday's close of 4.85 3-16. The opening was at 4.85 1-16.

The improvement was due mainly to the removal of uncertainty regarding the gold clause in American bonds and to the United States' favorable trade balance with a consequent pressure against the British pound.

There was no evidence of official selling and the rate closed at the best of the day.

The French franc closed at 73.75 compared to yesterday's price of 73.75 to the pound.
