## LEGISLATORS KILL MOVE TO ADJOURN SESSION MARCH 2

day on an adverse report, five members of the committee voting to kill the bill while four were favorable.

**Hamilton Tells Aim.**

Should the house make sufficient progress in disposing of its own measures, there will be no attempt today to stop work upon the 39 senate measures now up for final consideration, Representative Moore Hamilton, Jackson county, leader in the house "rebellion" against the senate's apparent unwillingness to bring house bills out of senate committee, said today. There is no use in needlessly holding up the work of the legislature, but it became necessary to show the senate what could be done by the house, he said.

Seven measures were killed on adverse committee reports today, including Representative Olsen's revenue producing bill by increasing corporation excise taxes. Others killed provided for appropriating money for the remodeling and fire-proofing of the state penitentiary; providing for the establishment of unemployment and social insurance, and a memorial requesting congress to change the name of the Bonneville dam to the "Columbia Roosevelt dam," all originating in the house.

**Sees End of Parties.**

The house bill which provided for the non-partisan election of county school superintendents drew considerable argument, Senator Allan Bynon of Multnomah county stating that it was the opening wedge for the doing away with party government, and that there was no need for such legislation.

Senator James E. Haxlett of Hood River declared that schools should be taken entirely out of party politics. "There is no reason why county school superintendents should be elected on a partisan platform," he declared.

"The strength of our government is based upon parties," Senator Dellmore Lesard declared. "If we take out the county school superintendents we might as well take out our state legislators. We must keep some offices on the partisan ballot. We might make this office non-partisan, but we cannot make it non-functional."

The senate turned down two other measures providing for the non-partisan election of district auditors and county auditor of Multnomah county. The vote was 22 to 6 on the former and 19 to 6 on the latter. Virtually the same arguments were advanced as on the county superintendent bill.

A bill providing for the rotation of names on the general election ballot was voted down. Senator Zimmerman favored the measure because it would give each candidate a chance to have his name at the top of the ballot.

He ran around to the back of his auto and peered at me. Finally, he got up enough courage to step from behind the machine, and I was able to convince him everything was all right. I told him I wanted help and he helped me locate the airplane factory in Los Angeles.

"God, fellow," the man said to Post, "I was frightened stiff. I thought you had dropped out of the moon, or somewhere."
