was held Friday at the Medford hotel with twelve representatives of the service clubs and relief and character building agencies present.

Election of officers was held and J. C. Mann was re-elected as president

of the association by a unanimous vote. The thanks of the nominating committee, consisting of Miss Mildred Carlton, chairman, Mrs. Dolph Phipps and Larry Schade, was extended to Mr. Mann for his splendid work during the past year. Miss Ruth Menzel was elected secretary-treasurer.

Mrs. R. E. Green, representing the Girl Scouts,

spoke briefly on the Court of Awards held Thursday night. One hundred proficiency badges were awarded and twenty-five girls advanced to rank of Second Class. The badges show a great deal of work being done by the Scouts in their community.

Miss Lillian Roberts of the Red Cross

announced a conference of social workers to be held in Eugene Sunday and Monday when speakers from Portland will be present.

Miss Mildred Carlton, representing the health association,

told of extension of the health work throughout the county. A great many tuberculin tests are being given in the county schools, a splendid preventive measure, she said. Services of the county nurses are being used more and more by the schools. Miss Carlton also made a very favorable report on the Christmas seal sale.

Larry Schade of the Boy Scouts

announced the Father and Son banquet to be held Monday evening in the Junior High school gymnasium. About 400 scouts and fathers are expected at one of the largest banquets ever held in Medford for the Scouts. Mr. Schade spoke at length on the National Jamboree at Washington, D. C., in August. Thirty-two Scouts from the Council are expected to attend.

Active club was represented by Harold Larson,

who said the club's major activity at present was the Boy Scout troop they sponsored. They are planning to help in sending one Scout from Troop No. 16 to the National Jamboree. The club is also planning for the Father and Son banquet, at which between 60 and 70 will be present from the troop.

Mrs. Dolph Phipps spoke for the Girls Community club

and announced new activities being sponsored by the group. An orchestra has been organized of the girls of the club, and a contract bridge class is playing each Thursday evening. Mrs. O. A. Eden is instructing the four tables.
