

RELEASE BRITES ON PROMISE TO DEPART COUNTY

The Brite brothers, Coke and John, of Jacksonville, sentenced to serve six months in the county jail, and pay fines of \$50 in justice court Saturday for assault and battery upon Harold Reed, will be released authorities said today, if they leave Jackson county and the state of Oregon.

To this end, the two brothers are making arrangements to have their auto placed in running condition so they can depart for California and the district attorney's office said it was reported to them, citizens of Jacksonville were planning to take up a subscription, to make sure the auto was fixed.

The Brite brothers were sentenced for pummeling Reed after he refused to serve them beer. Reed had informed the brothers, "you've had enough already," he told the court.

The pugnacity of the Brites, when in the cups has brought them in contact with the law several times in the past six months. On one rampage they took the handcuffs away from a Jacksonville officer. Another time they knocked two teeth out of the mouth of a Portland drummer, without provocation. Their flatness process at a Saturday night dance also brought them into court. Heretofore, leniency has been extended, on promise to be temperate and behave.

Citizens of Jacksonville say the brothers when normal are agreeable and pleasant, and hard working miners, but when drinking are troublesome and combative. "The people of Jacksonville like the boys when they are not drinking," Justice of the Peace William R. Coleman said. "They are fine fellows, they tell me, except when on one of their toots."

HITTON ASKS RELEASE OF RESTRAINING ORDER AGAINST GOLD DEPOSIT

A demurrer and petition were filed today by W. E. (Jud) Hitton, miner of the Skikyou, who reportedly wrested \$16,500 in gold from claims, to the suit of George M. Roberts, Edwin P. Hughes, W. H. Summers, Ed Marshall and George P. Barton.

The petition asks a vacation or modification of the restraining order prohibiting Hitton use of the \$16,500, and "the transaction of ordinary corporate business," on the grounds a final decision on the same case is pending in the California courts.

The demurrer asks dismissal of the suit filed in the Jackson county courts, on the grounds:

"There is a misjoinder of the parties plaintiff";

"The plaintiffs have no legal capacity to sue";

"And insufficient facts to constitute a cause of action are submitted";

The plaintiffs allege in their complaint that Hitton, "surreptitiously removed the gold without authority," and that he seeks to buy up controlling stock interest in the property.

The mining properties involved are the "Ruby Mining Claim company," and the "Lucky 13 Mining Corporation," both located in Skikyou county, a short distance from the state line, in the Elliott Creek district.

OAKLAND POLICE NAB YOUTH WANTED HERE

Arva Lozier, 17, wanted in this city on charges of grand larceny, has been arrested in Oakland, California, and is being held there until he can be taken into custody by local authorities who will return him here. Lozier has waived extradition.

CAMPAIGN GROWS IN SIGHT SAVING

CLEVELAND (UP)—Since organization of the Sight-Saving Council here last August, councils have been organized or are in process of creation in 48 other cities, according to reports received here at the council's office.

The movement to promote scientific care of the eyes was initiated here on account of the increase in defective eyesight, noted throughout the country.

Representatives of the council have addressed 20,000 persons in 225 meetings in Cleveland alone. Printing and distribution of 200,000 educational pamphlets has also been carried out.

Statistics compiled by the council show that of all school children under 20, more than 20 per cent have defective eyesight; that the eyes of 40 per cent of college undergraduates are defective; that 75 per cent of the population over 50 years old has defective vision.

The council believes that vision can be protected, improved and preserved by proper lighting and care by experts. The group's executive
