

BABY BOND SALE OPENS FRIDAY AT POSTOFFICE HERE

A supply of United States Savings bonds ranging in denomination from \$25 to \$500, generally referred to as "Baby Bonds," was received today at the Medford postoffice and will be put on sale tomorrow, Friday, Mar. 1.

R. G. Beach, assistant postmaster, said a great demand is anticipated for the bonds, which will mature after 10 years and are redeemable at any time after 60 days from the date of purchase. Before the end of the first year they will be redeemable at the purchase price, and after that time will begin to increase in value.

These bonds, which due to their low denominations are expected to become a popular investment, were issued in denominations of \$25, \$50, \$100 and \$500, maturity value. They will be sold at the following respective figures: \$18.75, \$37.50, \$75 and \$375. These bonds are registered with the treasury department.

If held to maturity, the bonds will yield about 2.9 per cent interest per annum compounded semi-annually. If redeemed prior to maturity they will yield less varying with the respective redemption value. The bonds are exempt from all taxes, federal and state, except estate or inheritance taxes.

Mr. Beach, who will be in charge of the sale here, pointed out that not more than \$10,000 maturity value in these bonds can be purchased by any one person during any one calendar year.

A table of values received if the purchaser wishes to turn in the bonds before maturity, is printed on the face of the bonds.

They will go on sale tomorrow in all first, second and third and certain fourth class postoffices throughout the country.

The checks were cleverly forged, police say, the ability of the boy to write clearly having been in his favor, as no suspicions were held as to the checks' authenticity at the time they were passed.

The boy will be turned over to the juvenile court for action.



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SOCIAL SECURITY FROM U. S. FUNDS NEW SUGGESTION

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—(AP)—A bill to provide that old age pensions and unemployment insurance be financed out of the federal treasury was offered today by Senator Lewis (D., Ill.), as a substitute for the administration's social security measure.

In a statement, Senator Lewis said the substitute lays "down the principle that the government should provide for the citizens solely out of the federal funds; that the government shall treat the United States citizens as citizens of the United States and leave the state funds for state pensions wholly to the state treasury."

Lewis hoped to work out a complete new substitute with President Roosevelt for the Wagner-Lewis bill now being considered by the house ways and means committee.

Coincident with President Roosevelt's return to the city, reports reached Capitol Hill today that some of his advisors were perturbed over changes already made in the social security bill.

Because of this some members of the house ways and means committee expressed doubt as to what the president's attitude would be when the amended bill is presented to him for his approval.

SALEM, Feb. 28.—(AP)—Legislators in the Oregon assembly today became aware of the potentialities of power they placed in the hands of Governor Charles H. Martin when they passed the budgetary control bill, one of the administration measures which was approved after the two houses believed they had taken the teeth out of the original proposal.

This reaction came to them following a press conference last night with the chief executive in which he voiced displeasure at the action of the joint ways and means committee in ignoring his recommendations against restoring half of the legislative salary cut to state officials and employees, and declared he would block the move even to the extent of using his

power under the budget control bill to force the original reduction.

"I may be forced under the recently enacted budgetary control bill to retain the 1933 legislative cut, and if employees don't like it they can quit. I will have no trouble in finding efficient men among the 10,000 applications on file in my office," Governor Martin said. His statement referred only to the many departments over which he has control.
