TOP BUTTER REDUCED IN PORTLAND MARKET

PORTLAND, Feb. 28.—(AP)—Top score cube butter offerings were reduced 1 1/2c in price on the produce exchange with lower scores off 1c lb. at the same time.

Cut of 3c in the buying price on butterfat indicated the real weakness underlying the trade.

Further general decline was forced in the egg price effective for the day. Only the lower grades were unchanged. Beginning of the storage season was expected next week.

Further advance in the price of chickens here is due to one of the greatest famines of offerings the local trade has shown for a very extended period.

SCREEN REVIEW

"Little Colonel," the picture co-starring Lionel Barrymore and Shirley Temple, while having many entertaining high lights, is not up to standard for those two, in my opinion. Barrymore is convincing as the southern gentleman, but then he very seldom is not convincing, no matter what he happens to be portraying, and personally I think the white beard and bushy eye-brows are wasted on a man of his talents. They hide most of his usually remarkable facial expressions, the high-lights of most of his shows.

Miss Temple, attired in an old-fashioned dress of her grandmother's, is as darling as ever, but the role is a difficult one, and the little star is not quite up to the scenes in which she is supposed to vent her temper in rage. I think perhaps her tiny head is beginning to turn under all the adulation of the people of the nation. There certainly could be no wonder if that be the case. At any rate she is not nearly so convincing as she has been in other pictures. Perhaps I am just super-critical.

Every small boy and girl in the county will enjoy the picture, but a few of those who are past that qualification may agree with me that the picture is only fair, even if the eastern critics do give it a high ranking.

One of the high lights, along with Barrymore's excellent portrayal, is the staid dance number of the colored star, Bill Robinson. It was darn good. So much I am unable to say for John Lodge, as the northerner who carries off the old colonel's daughter. Evelyn Venable is only passing fair, although I have enjoyed her work in most of her pictures.

The Vitaphone shorts is better than most Vitaphone shorts, but that's not saying much. They're generally lousy. I'd rate the whole program about two stars, if I may take the "liberty" of doing so.
