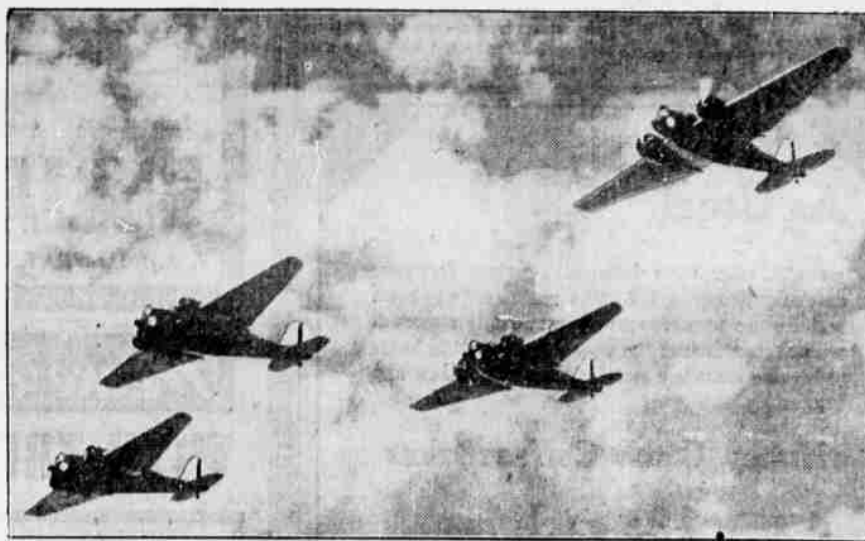
Trio from Los Angeles Make Brief Medford Visit

ANNUAL KLAMATH WINTER CARNIVAL IS NEXT SUNDAY

With snow conditions ideal and fair weather in prospect, the ninth annual Crater Lake Ski club winter sports carnival next Sunday at Fort Klamath promises to be one of the most successful in several seasons. The program will include a large variety of events, according to a telephone message this afternoon from Alfred Castel, club president.

One of the big features of the day, the 32-mile ski race classic from the carnival grounds to Crater Lake and return will start at 8 o'clock in the morning, with the finish probably taking place during the noon hour. Rudy Lueck, a Medford entrant, Pete Hedberg and O. K. Puck of Klamath Falls are the three leading contestants. All have been winners in past events.

The 16-mile down race, with 30 entrants, will leave the Crater Lake lodge at the same time and will probably finish 90 minutes later.

The main program at the grounds will begin at 11:30 with a high school boys' one-half mile race; 11:50, ladies' two mile race; 12:20, grade school boys' one mile; 12:35, grade school girls' one-half mile; 12:45, high school boys' three-mile relay; 1:00, one hundred yard dash for boys from six to nine years; 1:10, high school girls' one mile; 1:35, service clubs' one mile; 2:30, ski jumping for A, B, and C classes.

Skiers are expected to be present from the Skyliners of Bend, Rogue Snowmen of Medford, Mt. Shasta Snowmen of Mt. Shasta and the Cascade club of Portland.

A baseball game on skis is also planned for the afternoon, in addition to numerous novelty events. A new race course will be used for all race events, providing more thrills for spectators. Toboggan slides will also be in use. A big carnival dance will be held tomorrow night, followed by a similar dance Sunday night.

Conditions in the plants for the men and they have not been improved. "The time has come for action!" Dillon said the locals asked to take a strike vote are located in 17 states, mostly eastern and mid-western. He said a majority of the membership vote would not be needed to authorize a strike, but that members of any one local could suspend work if three-quarters of its membership favored such action.

The action of the council, which has been in session here for nearly a week was unexpected, because President Green last week said the federation was "thinking in terms of peace" in the automobile industry, and that no strike was planned. At the same time he severely criticized the automobile labor board, headed by Leo T. Zolman, which he said followed a procedure in selecting collective bargaining committees under which "no free, independent election could be held."

SEARCHERS CLAIM QUASHED BY COURT

The demurrer of the district attorney to the suit of William C. Lindsay of the Dead Indian district, against Jackson county, for approximately \$800 for asserted services in the search for three years ago for Edwin C. Brown and wife, homesteaders who perished in a blizzard, was sustained by Judge H. D. Norton, in an order handed down yesterday. The action means that the complaint is quashed. A number of others were linked with Lindsay as plaintiffs.

The demurrer was based upon the Oregon law providing that the county court has no authority to pay bills which it does not directly authorize. The plaintiffs held that the sheriff and coroner advised searchers they would be reimbursed.

The Browns disappeared in January, 1932, when they left the cabin of a neighbor to go to their own. They were caught in a snowstorm. In the spring, when the snow melted, their bodies were found by a searching party headed by then Sheriff Ralph G. Jennings.

BURGLARY RING BELIEVED BROKEN

True bills returned yesterday by the grand jury against Julian Daily, Carl Tremaine and Glenn Stringer, on burglary not within a dwelling changes, the district attorney's office alleges, will clear up the series of burglaries that occurred in this city from a year to 18 months ago. Stringer is serving a three-year term in state prison for his connection with the Mann store burglary last October; Daily is held in the county jail, and Tremaine is at large.
