All four issues are under special order of business. The senate will start on the Snider resolution calling for completion of the 1917 highway program before any more work is done on other roads.

KILL 1000 CROWS BY DYNAMITE AT GOLD RAY ROOST

An estimated 1,000 crows were killed in a dynamite bomb blast touched off by local and valley sportsmen at a crow rookery on an island in the Rogue river near Gold Ray dam last night, according to Justice Smith of this city, who supervised and promoted the enterprise.

Becoming alarmed at the increasing number of the predatory birds, which each year destroy untold numbers of quail and pheasant eggs, the sportsmen banded together in the effort to rid the valley of at least some of the pests.

Bombs, made of a stick of dynamite, with the case around it filled with shot, a dynamite cap and connecting wires, were hung in the willow trees throughout the rookery. When the crows came in at dusk, 40 of the bombs, containing 116 pounds of shot, were fired.

This morning several of the men, at the suggestion of Mrs. Syd Richardson, manager of the Jackson County Humane society, who cooperated in the move, went to the scene of the blast and dispatched the crows, 30 or 40 of them.

There are about 10 or 12 thousand of the pests in the rookery, sportsmen say, but it may be impossible to destroy the rest of them this year, in that they may be too wary after last night's blast. Preparations are already under way for an extensive drive against crows in this valley next year.

The dynamite for the bombs was furnished at cost by the Timber Products company, and the shot was furnished at cost by Lamport's sporting goods store.

Similar work is being done all through the country in an effort to reduce the loss of game bird eggs to crows, it having been estimated that over 40 per cent of all the duck eggs in one breeding ground were destroyed by crows last year, to cite but one example.

GUADALAJARA, Mexico, March 4.—(AP)—Armed troops patrolled the streets today to prevent repercussions from a Sabbath clash in which three persons were killed and at least eight others wounded.

Governor Everardo Topete declared that "fanatics and clerical elements" were responsible for the events leading to the killings.

The disturbance occurred when a group of unidentified men opened fire from the balcony and roof of the municipal palace on a crowd of 3000 persons demonstrating against compulsory socialistic education.

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PINKY'S RHYMES ARE VERY PUNK, BUT SONGS CLICK

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—The peculiar verification of lack of it distinguishing the song-bit, "Object of My Affections," was no accident. Its successor, sung by song-writer Pinky Tomlin in his first picture, "Times Square Lady," is called "What's the Reason I'm Not Pleased?"

Pinky will sing it—you know he will—as "What's the reason—I'm not pleased—you." And with no apologies, either.

Pinky is aware that better-known song-writers than he have criticized his first hit. The strange "breaks" and the lack of rhyme notwithstanding, "Object" has sold phenomenally. ("Object" is Pinky's pet name for his musical key to Hollywood.)

To such critics Pinky concedes that they can play piano while he plays only a guitar, that they may know a great deal more about it than he does, but on the other hand—"Object" is a hit.

In his new song he rhymes "milk" with "milk."

"I know they don't rhyme," he says, "but what do I care—that's my business. And if the public likes it, well!"

Pinky, tall and lean, thin-faced, scant-haired and bespectacled, broke all the rules in getting into films. By those rules he should still be wandering around trying to get somebody to listen to his song, and meanwhile starving.

Instead, Truman Tomlin, so-called "hog-calling crooner" who finished a law course at the University of Oklahoma, is a Hollywood sensation, getting a thousand a week for singing and acting, and extra for his songs. Pinky is not surprised, especially. He expected to be a success. Everybody at home and at college, where he had a band, thought "Object" was a wop.

Pinky did not know it would be so easy here. All he did was to persuade Jimmy Oriet to let him sing it with the orchestra at a night spot, and the movie scouts did the rest. But Pinky is religious and he believes in predestination. He felt he was predestined to succeed. He was so sure of success that he turned down an offer of \$1,500 for rights to his song before he left his home in Durant, Okla.

For all that, Pinky's spectacles are not rose-colored glasses. Despite his collegiate assurance, he looks older than his twenty-seven years. "I'm not used to getting breaks," he said. "This is the first time I've had roses—I'm more used to thorns. No, I'm not going to buy a lot of things. If I've got the money I can always spend it. I'm in no hurry."
