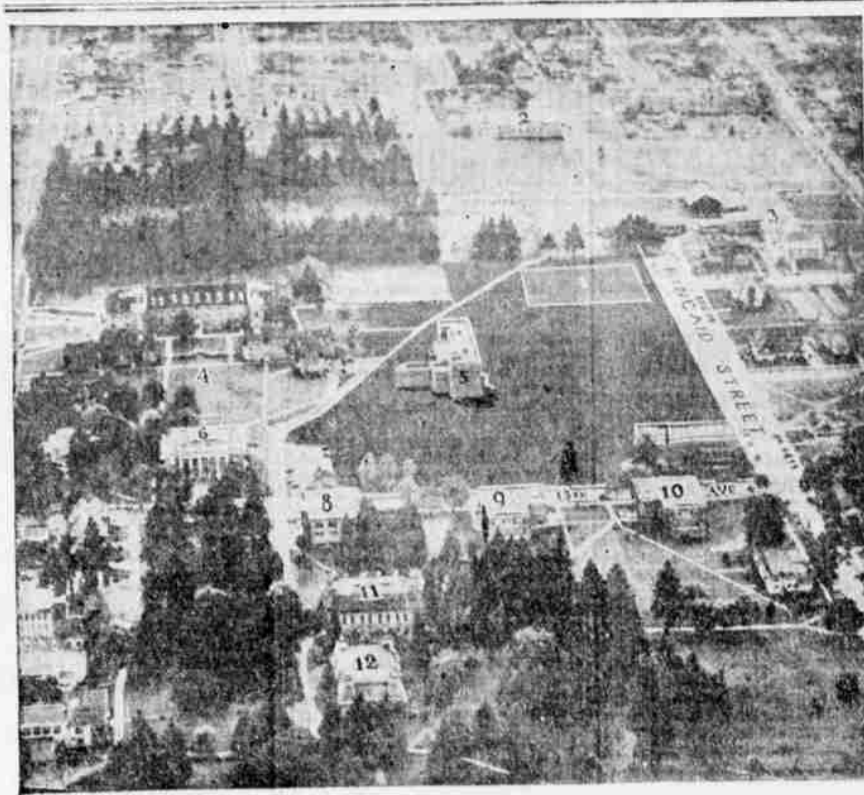

## HOW NEW LIBRARY WILL FIT INTO CAMPUS AT U. OF O.



The above diagrammatic photograph gives a graphic impression of just exactly where the new \$350,000 library will be located on the University of Oregon campus. The rectangle numbered "1" is the approximate site of the structure. ## PORTLAND NAMES TRAFFIC SLEUTHS

**PORTLAND, March 5.**—(AP)—On the premise that a citizen is not a good citizen if he witnesses a law violation and fails to report it, 500 carefully selected residents of Portland went to work today to assist police in making the city's streets more safe for motorists and pedestrians alike. Each of the 500 responsible men and women was given ten report cards on which to advise police of any serious violations of the traffic code. The police will follow each report with a letter and suggest correction of bad driving habits.

## 75 PER CENT OF AGED ARE GRANTED PENSION

**EUGENE, Mar. 5.**—(AP)—About 75 per cent of the persons who applied for old age pensions in Oregon last year received payments from the state, it was reported at a meeting of the League of Oregon Cities here Monday. The report said 9,377 persons applied and 7,077 pensions were granted. Oregon spent \$648,393 on these pensions last year, and the 35 counties which have reported have budgeted \$969,240 for this fund for 1935, an increase of nearly 50 per cent.

## NORMAN J. PENNICK NEW FOREST AIDE

Norman J. Pennick assumed the position of administration assistant to Karl Janouch, supervisor of Rogue River national forest, upon his arrival this morning from Portland. ## DRUNKEN LADY DRIVER GIVEN NO SYMPATHY

**PORTLAND, March 5.**—(AP)—Mrs. Sue Hammel, convicted of drunken driving, found herself in a less enviable position today than when she appealed from the municipal court conviction to the more august circuit court.

In municipal court she was sentenced to 30 days in jail and was fined \$100. In circuit court she was sentenced to 31 days in jail and was fined \$125.

## DEFORMED INFANT HAS LIFE CHANCE

**NEWBURGH, N. Y., March 5.**—(AP)—Little Robert Linsing, born without an esophagus more than two weeks ago, was given a "better than 50-50" chance to survive today as physicians planned an unusual operation if he lives to be 15 years old. "The baby now has lived longer than usual in cases of this sort," Dr. Frederick R. Small said, "and every day it looks a little better for him. The usual span of life in such cases is 10 days and Robert has lived 16 days." Dr. Small, who assisted Dr. James C. Donagan when a small hole was cut in the child's stomach and a tube inserted for feeding, said an operation to replace the esophagus was planned but it could not be performed for at least 15 years.

## UNION SETS NOT PRODUCE, RULING

**SALEM, March 5.**—(AP)—The supreme court today ruled that in defining the term "produce" to include "fruits, vegetables, live and dressed poultry, dressed wool, pork, mutton and beef," the legislature unquestionably had reference to food products, and not to union sets grown and sold exclusively for purposes of propagation. An opinion by Justice Bailey in the case of State vs. William S. Hurst and W. Reginald Hurst, appellants, today stated. The defendants were convicted under the "produce dealers and peddlers act" of contracting as cash buyers of union sets for resale, and refusing to pay cash therefor within 48 hours after demand, as provided in the act.
