PORTLAND BUTTER PRICES TAKE DIP

PORTLAND, March 5.—(AP)—During the late session of the produce exchange there was a loss of 1c lb. each for the two top score butters, 1 1/2c loss for prime firsts and unchanged for firms.

The price on butterfat was lowered 1c lb. along with the cut of extra butter, thereby lowering both butter and fat to the values established late last week.

Trading in the egg market was considered of steady character, although here and there was a note of business where receipts piled up on some of the smaller operators.

Trading trend in the chicken market continued of firm character with full recent advances generally maintained. For selected stock occasional small premium was suggested.

AUTO SUSPECTS TAKEN PORTLAND
O. D. Irwin, arrested here last week by state police and sheriff's office authorities, yesterday appeared before U. S. Commissioner Victor Tengwald, under the name he was using when arrested, Ray King, also his wife, Mrs. Louise King, and were bound over to federal grand jury in Portland, the man under \$5,000 bond, and the woman with bond set at \$2,000.

The two were taken to Portland yesterday by Deputy U. S. Marshal Leo McLean, to face a charge growing out of a violation of the Dyer act, when the two brought a stolen automobile to this city several weeks ago. Local authorities were uncertain as to whether Irwin would face the Dyer act charges before facing escape charges filed against him for his Kansas state penitentiary break at Lansing in 1933. He was charged with the Dyer act violation before it was learned of his prison record, state police said today.
