MILITANT FARMERS OF MINNESOTA EXTOLLED BY GOVERNOR OLSON

ST. PAUL, Minn., March 7.—(AP)—Echoes of a suggestion by Governor Floyd B. Olson for an "economic revolution" were heard today while several hundred farm aid advocates marched back to their homes.

Governor Olson was called a "prophet" and the "great president of the United States" by Milo Reno, president of the National Farmers' Holiday association, whose Minnesota branch sponsored a trek by Minnesota farmers to the state house to demand legislative relief for agriculture.

Addressing the farm delegation the governor yesterday urged an "economic revolution" and praised the "militant farm movement" in Minnesota as one that "is not talking about the tariff on cocoonist oil, but about legislation," which prompted Reno to criticize "big business," the AAA and President Roosevelt.

"If president Roosevelt had kept his pledge to the people," asserted Reno, "we would have been out of this trouble in two weeks. The AAA? It has no more chance to succeed than did Herbert Hoover's farm board. The AAA has gone up salt creek to keep company with the politicians who were put in charge of the farm board."

GEORGE STEAD OF ROGUE RIVER DIES

George B. Stead, resident of Rogue River, Ore., for the past three and one-half years, passed away at the family residence at 3:30 p. m. Wednesday after a short illness.

Mr. Stead was born at Waterloo, Iowa, August 24, 1874. He spent his early life in Iowa, and also gained his early education there, later assuming a position with his father, William Stead, in the contracting business and also brick-making.

Mr. Stead was an excellent brick maker. He was united in marriage to Alia Julia Carper at Waterloo, Iowa, in 1894.

She passed away in 1902. Mr. Stead came west in 1919, and took a contract in Washington, which lasted one year, when he went to Eugene to be with his son, and lived in Eugene for 10 years before coming to southern Oregon.

He was again united in marriage at Grants Pass, to Martha Seaman, in 1923. They have lived at Rogue River since their marriage.

He leaves, besides his widow, one son, Wayne B. Stead of Medford, and one brother, A. W. Stead of Tonsasket, Wash.; two nieces and one nephew and four grandchildren.

Funeral services, in charge of the Perl Funeral Home, will be announced later.

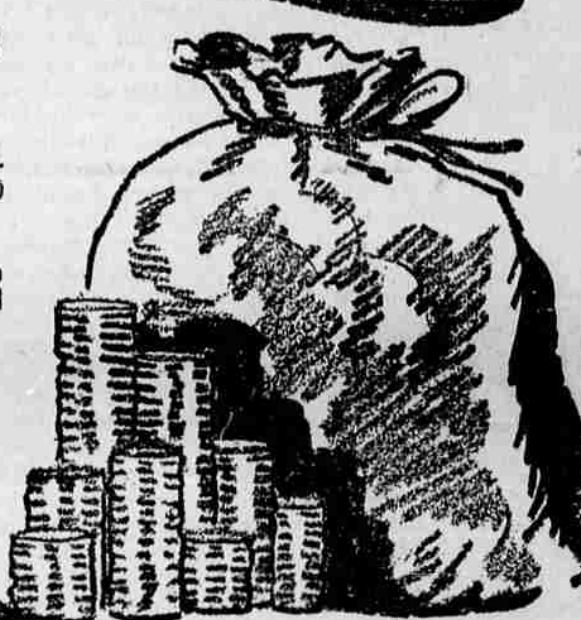

The Ben Franklin Quiz game consists in the reading of sixty pictographs which will be published in the SUNDAY OREGONIAN, beginning on Sunday, March 10, 1935. Each pictograph will be found to express pictorially a saying or saying of Benjamin Franklin, such sayings being contained in the OREGONIAN'S Revival Edition of Poor Richard's Almanack, each saying being preceded by a number which represents it. Entrants are to choose the most appropriate saying for the sixty pictographs, and in the space provided on the answer blank printed beneath each pictograph write down the number which represents the selected saying. 3. Pictographs and answers are to be submitted at one time after the close of the Ben Franklin Quiz Game. The game starts with the publication of the first pictographs Sunday, March 10, 1935, and eight pictographs will be published each Sunday thereafter until the final four pictographs are published on Sunday, April 28. Participants will be allowed two weeks to prepare their sets of answers and all answers to qualify in the judging for the award must be deposited in the main office of the OREGONIAN by 12 midnight May 11, 1935. Participants are permitted to mail answers, and all answers submitted by mail will be accepted by the OREGONIAN, providing the letters bear a post mark not later than midnight May 4, 1935, and sufficient postage. In the event of an ultimate tie, each typing participant will receive the full prize tied. 6. Beneath each of the sixty pictographs is a ruled space for the number which represents the answer to the pictograph and a space for the entrant's name and address.
