

# Southern Oregon All-Star Quint Selected by Coaches

## Ashland, Klamath Furnish Material For Entire Team

From coaches of the four high schools who competed for the Copoc trophy, emblematic of the southern Oregon championship, comes this All-Southern Oregon Conference basketball team for 1935.

Although split into state tournament districts, with Klamath Falls competing in district number 3 and Medford, Ashland and Grants Pass in district 9, the old southern Oregon conference, as in years past, still goes on. Geographical situation and tradition makes it so. And, it will probably never be otherwise.

So come these all star teams—the selected cream of southern Oregon's high school basketball talent—chosen, after the most careful consideration of every player, by those same players' coaches: Darwin Burgher of Medford High's Tigers; Dale Ginn of the Cave-men from Grants Pass; Dwight French of Klamath Union High's Pelicans and Don Faber, coach of the championship Ashland high Grizzlies.

Based on Points

Players were placed on the basis of two points for first team mention and one point for second team mention; with men receiving the highest number of points getting the positions.

At center on the first team was placed Bob Hardy, of Ashland's Grizzlies. Six feet three inches tall, left handed and a sensational scorer, Hardy was the unanimous choice of all four coaches, receiving eight points, the highest number possible. Klamath's coach, Dwight French, said of him, "He can shoot with either left or right hand on his pivot shot and with deadly accuracy. He is cool, deliberate and at the same time very fast, and I believe him the most valuable man in the conference."

Ashland Forward's Place

For forwards, Ashland pulled down both positions. Billy Hoxie, six feet three, a dead shot and great dribbler, was also chosen unanimously by the coaches. He is a fine floor player and Darwin Burgher, Medford coach, says that he is the most valuable player in the conference.

Parker Hess, Grizzly captain, was named at the other position after a close race with Wakeman, Klamath Falls. Both received a total of five points but Hess was chosen because he received mention from every coach while Wakeman missed out altogether on one selection. Not a great scorer, Hess, nevertheless is probably the finest floor man of them all. He is a nice feeder and the best dribbler and defensive man on the Ashland team. Faber, his coach, says, "Smartest player in conference."

Klamath Men at Guard

Klamath Falls Pelicans made a clean sweep at the two guard positions. Nello Giovanni, Klamath captain, was the best liked guard of the coaches, receiving seven points, three first team mentions and one second and was also selected as the best leader of any player in southern Oregon, being named captain of the first team. Giovanni is a big fellow but fast as light. He is a great defensive player and the key man in the Pelican attack.

At the other guard position, Eglehoff won out over Ashland's Bill Jungwirth. As with Hess and Wakeman, both received five points but Eglehoff was mentioned by all four coaches and Jungwirth by only three. Not overly large, Eglehoff is a very fast dribbler, a good shot and brilliant on defense. Teamed with Giovanni, they make the best pair of guards Klamath has had in years.

Kittinger on Second

On the second team, Ray "Stretch" Kittinger of Medford was almost the unanimous choice. He missed only one vote for the center position and that coach placed him as a second team forward. Kittinger got the tip-off against all his opponents in every game Medford played, even against Hardy, and was the spark plug of the Tiger attack.

Second team forwards see Wakeman of Klamath Falls getting the position and Holloway, Grants Pass, the other. Wakeman was Klamath's leading scorer all year while Holloway's value was not overlooked by any of the coaches, he being named as captain of the second team.

## WILSON WINS NOD IN FEATURE FIGHT AT ELKS SMOKER

At Wilson, the Hill scrapper with the educated fists, hammy line way to a decision over Billy Limer of Indian Creek, in the main event of the OOC championship card at the Elks temple last night.

The battle was one of the prettiest exhibitions of speed and skill Medford has seen in many years. The well-matched pair went at it hammer and tongs, with Wilson having only a slight edge in the skirmishing.

Joe Meyerhofer of Spring Plains and Curry Logan of Garberry proved to be the perfect fighting combination. Meyerhofer could dish it out, and Logan could take it, and their slugfest lasted nearly three rounds before Meyerhofer finally measured Logan with a smashing right that sent him down for the count.

Chico Mercado of Indian Creek and Mike Teague of headquarters detachment brought the huge crowd to its feet with their three rounds of unorthodox but highly entertaining fist-fu. The boys lacked the technique of the more finished batter, but made up for it by hitting each other with everything but the ring-posts. Mercado was given the decision, but many of the brothers present expressed their dissatisfaction by giving the referee a loud and full-throated bird.

Zack Moore, Indian Creek, and Peanuts Hoyman, Kerty, mixed it up in good shape before Hoyman went down in the second for the count. Moore's deadly right was used in administering the coup de grace after the colored boy had put Hoyman in shape for the kill.

The bout between Walt Michalowski, Oregon Cave, and Farrell Snyder of Applegate, lasted quick. Michalowski inadvertently left his chin wide open and Snyder added another knockout to his record by letting him have it with enthusiasm.

The opener between Castellano, Oak Knoll, and Serafinaki, Oregon Cave, started the card off with a bang. The little boys fought toe-to-toe for two rounds, but Castellano finally got the drop on his opponent in the third, and the referee gave him the match on a technical knockout.

The big crowd surpassed the expectations of the Elks' committee-men, who are hoping to stage other CCC cards. A match between Snyder and Moore has been proposed and both boys have expressed a willingness to fight.

## COAST CAGE TITLE SERIES STARTS AT COLLEGE TONIGHT

CORVALLIS, Ore., March 8.—(AP)—The Pacific coast conference basketball championship goes on the block here tonight.

The "block" is the Oregon State college maple court where the truculent Trojans of University of Southern California match their renowned prowess against the hard-driving offense and leech-like defense of the embattled Oregon State college Beavers. The game starts at 7:30 p. m.

In case the teams divide games tonight and tomorrow night, a third contest will be played here Monday.

The only other northern-southern division playoff which brought the two teams together was two years ago when Oregon State won the coast championship with two out of three victories.

Delayed by a mid-California flood and washout which held up their train, the Trojans arrived here last night six hours behind schedule and at once donned basketball suits to limber up their travel-weary bodies. Their shooting eyes apparently suffered no ill effects.

Both teams were in fine condition with the exception of a regular guard on each outfit. Coach Sam Barry of Southern California said Captain Joe Kelly, the barking guard, still is bothered with a bad leg (his voice is okay) and probably will be replaced by Oram in the starting lineup.

First, the fans were impressed on learning he studies now and then. He seemed to be in no hurry to start training. At first he had no sparring partners—while Schmeling's place buzzed with activity.

Hamas, they learned to their amazement, did not lead a "time table" life. He frequently went to the opera in nearby Hamburg and seemed to enjoy the theater and concerts.

For his lunch and dinner—cooked in American style—Hamas always has one or two good sized mugs of foaming beer.

"Did you ever see Maxie drinking beer during his training?" asked the astonished Hamburgers.

So they came to see in paradox—and remained to admire.

"I feel fine," Hamas told the Associated Press, "and I think I shall win. If I do, I hope to get a title match with Max Beer. After my fight with Schmeling I plan to tour Germany and perhaps do some boxing in England."
