MONGOOSE A PEST IF TRANSPLANTED FROM OLD WORLD

Little Creature Is Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde of Animal Kingdom—Deadly Enemy of Poisonous Serpents

WASHINGTON, D. C.—(Sp.)—A hero in the old world, a pest and a curse in the new—that in brief is the record of the mongoose whose courage in battling the hooded cobra of India was immortalized by Kipling in his tale of Rikki-tikki-tavi.

"Every once in a while someone who has been reading the 'Jungle Book' writes to Washington to suggest that this doughty little animal be introduced into the United States to combat snakes and rats," says a bulletin from the Washington, D. C., headquarters of the National Geographic society.

"Then it happened to a young man who was imported to the United States as a mongoose official to distinguish the letter-writer by setting forth that the mongoose is a Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde of the animal kingdom who shows his worst side as soon as he is transplanted into a part of the world where nature did not originally place him. In fact, one way to get arrested is to bring a mongoose into the United States. Their introduction has been forbidden by federal statute for the last 35 years.

"If the sharp-toothed, pesonlike little animal would eat the poisonous snakes and stop there, everything might be all right. But it does not.

"Down in the West Indies—Jamaica in particular—inhabitants still have a vivid recollection of hundreds of mongoose pairs, overrunning the countryside and killing not only the snakes and lizards but the chickens, lambs, kids, and piglets. Even dogs and cats were not safe. Many kinds of birds were all but wiped out, for here was a new pest with which nature had never taught them to cope.

Upset Nature's Balance. "For the mongoose this was a paradise. Imported originally to kill the rats which were exterminating the cane fields, it all but exterminated these pests in short order. But when the rats were no longer numerous the ever-increasing hordes of mongooses had to turn to other food with devastating results. The killing of birds, snakes, and lizards eliminated some of the leading enemies of harmful insects which promptly increased until they became a plague. The whole delicate balance of nature was upset and it took years to re-educate it. A price was placed on the head of Rikki-tikki-tavi and he was hunted down relentlessly. On one estate 1400 mongooses were killed in a few months.

"On another British West Indian island, St. Lucia, the story was much the same, although here there existed an exceedingly deadly snake, the fer-de-lance, which has been virtually wiped out since the coming of the mongoose. To this immi-

grant from the old world contributed perhaps more by the indirect means of eating the food, primarily rats and mice, on which the serpent was wont to feed, than by direct attack. The terrible lance-head viper proved no such easy opponent as the hooded cobra of India against which the mongoose has performed a useful feat when it attacks.

Hair An Armor. "When a mongoose meets its sworn enemy, the serpent, its long hair stands straight up until the little creature in truth seems swollen to twice its normal size. The bristles deceive the snake into striking short and also form a cushioning armor which the death-dealing fangs find it hard to penetrate.

"Woolly creosures are the stories that the mongoose is immune to the snake's poison is that when bitten it goes off and finds a antidote or herb which it eats as a restorative. To conquer his cobra enemy, Rikki-tikki-tavi—who gets that name from the sound of his war-cry—depends on speed, courage, agility, and a tactical instinct inherited from a long line of snake-fighting forebears. He tries out the cobra by drawing repeated lunges. Then, so swiftly that the eye cannot follow, he darts in and crumbs the back of the head just above the hood. There he clings though the threatening snake may almost bang out his brains.

"In India the mongoose is domesticated to serve as protection against reptiles and to rid houses of rats and mice.

"Ancient Egyptians lavished affection and even veneration upon a member of the mongoose clan, the lehmemon or pharaoh's rat, which not only devoured snakes, rats, and lizards, but kept the number of crocodiles within bounds by feeding to a great extent upon their eggs.

"In just such fashion remote ancestors of the mongoose in far-off geological times may have hastened the downfall of the enormous scaly creatures of the age of reptiles by the simple expedient of eating their eggs, for here is one of nature's oldest blood-feuds."

ANCIENT SCROLLS MISSING CHAPTERS IN STORY OF MAN

Central Asia Believed by Scientists to Hold Key—Bandits, Disease Make Exploration Difficult Task

WASHINGTON, D. C.—(Sp.)—In Central Asia, scientists agree, many "missing chapters" in the story of mankind await explorers who are courageous, or lucky, enough to escape the handiit hordes, earthquakes and pestilence that render the area less accessible to the foreigner than the far away Antarctic.

A cable dispatch from Lanchow, in western China, reports that hundreds of rolls of Buddhist classics, musty with age, were recently dug up in the wind-swept courtyard of a monastery that flourished more than 1,300 years ago. The scrolls, written in both Sanskrit and Chinese, mention a far away city, believed to have been Babylon, but, more important, bits of poetry, strikingly similar to the earthworks then in use in Mesopotamia, were found near the scrolls.

The ruins of this monastery were discovered accidentally by a Taoist monk about thirty years ago. Struggling through the sand dunes to the Tung Huang district, he came upon what appeared to be a brass table top. Later excavation revealed it to be the crown of a huge statue of Buddha, with the monastery and scattered caves near-by.

Findings of a Geographic Expedition During its tractor-car crossing of Asia along the trail of Marco Polo in 1932, the Citroen-Hardt Expedition studied another of Central Asia's most interesting ancient sites—Bazaklik, in Sinkiang (Chinese Turkistan), a few hundred miles west of the scene of the recent Lanchow discoveries.

Dr. Maynard Owen Williams, National Geographic Society representative with the Citroen-Hardt Expedition, describes the experiences of an archeological group which spent more than a week studying and reproducing strange frescoes and cave temples of this hidden corner of the world.

"We spent eight busy days in the vicinity of Bazaklik," Dr. Williams writes, "while Jacoviet, the expedition artist, with a gasoline heater keeping his color palette from freezing, copied frescoes and the rest of us shivered in dark, dusty caverns behind our motion picture and natural cameras.

"In Bazaklik we found that excavated grooves bearing Uigur inscriptions had been taken over by the Buddhists, who roofed them with mud bricks, forming new arched ceilings. One fresco was evidently Manichaean art, with an ascetic religion, founded by a Babylonian, which spread to Rome, China, and India. Mani taught that light and goodness fought against darkness and evil in the souls of men.

Original Frescoe Badly Damaged "As fresco by Jacoviet, the Manichaean fresco has something of the delicacy and charm of a back drop from some graceful scene of oriental life, but the faded original was dark and badly damaged and the writing indistinct.

"How long a time elapsed between the Manichaean and the Buddhist frescoes is still a mystery, as is much of Central Asia's story, but there is enough Buddhist art remaining to indicate Buddhists reaching far to the west and south. Chinese art seems not to have influenced the Bazaklik frescoes.

"A celestial jaid band, a Mona Lisa smile, a bull-headed diva, and a red-bearded 'barbarian' were clear enough to have popular interest. These blue-eyed barbarians held up their soft-booby by suspenders, fastened to their belts, so did the Scythians, and others whose graves mark a route from Crimea, on the Black Sea, to Mongolia. Here history may not hang by a thread, but these boot-sneering art offers another clue to since-forgotten Indo-European relations with the continent of Central Asia.

"Not only commerce, but art and religion, politics and wood block type (one of the rudiments of printing), moved along the age-old 'Silk Routes' between East and West, recalled today only by neglected ruins and 'lost' monasteries and shrines."

Huge Bond Issue Planned by P.G.E.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 12.—(AP)—Pacific Gas & Electric company officials admitted today the company had sought federal sanction for its proposed \$45,000,000 refunding operation.

The company's plans include calling the outstanding \$44,836,000 5 1/2 per cent series C bonds, and substituting 4 per cent 30-year bonds.

RELIEF GARDEN PLAN OPENS IN 3 COUNTIES

PORTLAND, March 12.—(AP)—Utilization of large and small tracts of land for relief families got under way
