

HIGH SCHOOL TO ENTER CAMPAIGN FOR SAFE DRIVING

The phrase, "Let's Quit Killing" adopted by the Oregon State Motor association, in an endeavor to curb auto deaths, has been introduced to the students of the Medford Senior high school and a "little" campaign is being conducted.

This state-wide program has been widely advertised, but has not been put in use locally until the present time. C. G. Smith, principal of the Medford high school, stated this morning that the safety campaign was being conducted for two purposes.

"The first is to acquaint parents, through the children, with this automotive safety plan. The second purpose is to make the student more conscious of the necessity of safe driving and considering the careless things that the other driver may do," said Mr. Smith.

The campaign was opened this afternoon in the auditorium of the local high school when some 600 students heard H. E. Robinson, instructor of speech, give a lecture containing many interesting statistics of the death rates in Oregon and also national statistics.

"Conditions are little short of desperate! In 1934 our automobile accidents produced an economic loss of one and one-quarter billion dollars, more than twice the live loss. We injured more than 1,000,000 people. We killed 35,500 persons, one every 15 minutes. We have reached the place where Albert W. Whitney, vice-president of the National Safety Council, backed by national statistics, can say, 'If you have three children, the probability is that one of them will be killed or injured in an automobile accident,'" was the portion of Mr. Robinson's talk that sounded a note of warning to student pedestrians and drivers.

Tomorrow, in the public speaking classes, each student will make a short speech on some phase of the subject for a prize donated by R. E. Robinson.

Memorial services will be held Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock in the Masonic temple, with Rev. H. H. Mitchell, vicar of Trinity Episcopal church conducting the services in conjunction with the Eastern Star. Interment will be in the mausoleum.

"At breakfast I found fault, too. You spilled things. You gulped down your food. You put your elbows on the table. You spread butter too thick on your bread. And as you started off to play and I made for my train, you turned and waved a little hand and called, 'Good-bye Daddy' and I frowned, and said in reply, 'Hold your shoulders back!'

"Then it began all over again in the late afternoon. As I came up the hill road I spied you, down on your knees playing marbles. There were holes in your stockings. I humiliated you before your boy friends by making you march ahead of me back to the house. Stockings were expensive—and you if you had to buy them you would be more careful. Imagine that, son, from a father! It was such stupid, silly logic.

"Do you remember, later, when I was reading in the library, how you came in, softly, timidly, with a sort of hurt, hunted look in your eyes? When I glanced up over my paper, impatient at the interruption, you hesitated at the door. 'What is it you want?' I snapped.

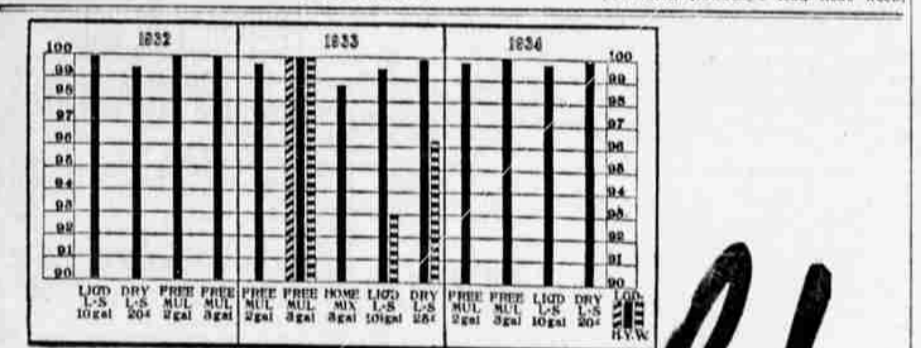
