

COUNTY SETS FEE FOR COURT HOUSE AUDITORIUM USE

Janitor services for the meetings were also increasing. The county court, recently denied the request for groups for use of the auditorium, on regular weekly evenings.

The resolution, in full, as passed and signed by all three members of the county court is as follows: "Whereas, the demands for the use of the County Auditorium, located in the Court House at Jackson County, Oregon, have grown to such a proportion that it is becoming embarrassing, and therefore evident that some strict limitations concerning its use are absolutely necessary; and

"Whereas, it is the belief of the County Court that it is for the best interests of Jackson County that the use of said auditorium be limited to official county business and court-house activities, non-political meetings, and non-sectarian groups, none of which meetings shall be held for profit; and

"Whereas, the expense for heat, light, and janitor service in connection with the use of said auditorium is becoming increasingly more serious; and

"Whereas, the sum of Two Dollars (\$2.00) for a half day, or any part thereof, and the sum of Four Dollars (\$4.00) for any evening would be a reasonable estimate of the cost of such expense.

"Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved that the use of said auditorium shall be limited to official county business and court-house activities, non-political meetings, and non-sectarian groups, none of which meetings shall be held for profit; and

"That this resolution shall be effective from and after the 1st day of April, 1935.

HITTSOON ANSWERS SUIT OVER MINING

An answer was filed yesterday by W. E. (Jud) Hittson, Siskiyou miner, to the suit filed by George M. Roberts, Edwin P. Hughes, Ed Marshall and George P. Barton, for an accounting of \$16,500 allegedly wrested by Hittson from the Lucky 13 and Ruby mining claims, located in the Elliott creek district of California.

The answer contends that inasmuch as the mining property is still in litigation in the California courts, the suit filed in this county should be held in abeyance until a final decision is made in the California courts and the further contention is set forth that Oregon courts have no jurisdiction. If Hittson prevails in the California courts, the prayer is made that the local suit be dismissed and the costs assessed to the plaintiffs.

A Siskiyou county, California, superior court decision in a suit is attached to the answer. The decision concerns property rights of litigants in the Lucky 13 claims No. 1 and No. 2, the Ruby mine claims, and the Ruby mine claims extensions.

son and Ashby B. Dickson of Portland. The governor has not yet named his two, but speculation was that he would name D. O. Hood, budget director, and Evan Reames of Medford.

Martin Thanks Solons. As the session drew to a close Governor Charles H. Martin sent a special message to the house of representatives and the senate voicing his appreciation of their accomplishments.

A survey of the 38th legislative assembly revealed that the legislature had appropriated more than \$13,787,000, an excess of almost \$2,000,000 over the anticipated revenue.

Accomplishments of the legislature, in brief, was summarized as follows: A bill permitting cities to refund outstanding bonds.

Canceling penalty and interest on taxes for 1931 and 1933. Partial payment at any time on delinquent taxes.

Creation of the state planning board, an administration measure. Permitting the state police to intervene in labor disputes.

Putting before the people vote on changing the date of the primary election from May to September. The measure giving the governor power to supervise budgets.

Free toll on the five Oregon coast bridges. The Rogue river closing to commercial fishing.

The Sunday closing for butchers and grocers in Portland. Liquor revenue of \$4,000,000 for unemployment relief.

Two million dollars for old age and indigent relief. The state power act for rural electrification, including the creation of a power commission to build transmission lines from Bonneville.

The timber acquisition bill, providing for the federal acquisition of private timber lands. The truck and bus bill amending the motor vehicle act, liberalizing the regulation of smaller trucks.

Lift Blockade On Crockett Refinery

CROCKETT, Calif., March 14—(AP) A truce was declared today in the blockade of the California-Hawaiian sugar refinery whereby the 400 beleaguered workers will be permitted to leave the plant.

The refinery was blockaded by pickets of the International Longshoremen's association after the warehousemen voted not to affiliate with the I. L. A.
