## POTSHERDS PROVE BIBLE'S ACCURACY DECLARES EXPERT

Inscriptions Date Back to Time of Jeremiah—Find Will Remove Skepticism of Biblical Accounts

JERUSALEM, March 15.—(AP)—(Palmer Agency)—Professor Harry Torczyner, expert on semitic languages of the Hebrew university of Jerusalem, said today that 12 inscribed potsherds found several days ago at Tel Adzuver, ancient Lachish, by J. L. Starkey, head of the Wellcome Archaeological research expedition, date back definitely to the time of Jeremiah, 2500 years ago.  
 Professor Torczyner said a remarkable aspect of the script was that it appears to be written in ordinary ink, such as might be used today and that the discovery is "the most valuable find ever made in this period of the first temple."  
 Dr. Starkey has entrusted the task of deciphering the important fragments to Professor Torczyner.  
 Proves Bible's Accuracy  
 The latter stated that the discovery on the site of ancient Lachish, greatest fortress in the southern area of the kingdom of Judah, adds irrefutable testimony of the accuracy of the Bible in its account of the period of kings. It was declared that this newest find, enriching the facts already assembled by archeology, will go a far way toward causing a revision of the skeptical attitude toward the biblical accounts which prevails in some quarters.  
 Lachish was the fortress which offered resistance to Nebuchadnezzar, king of Babylon, when he swept down upon Judah after King Zedekiah had renounced the allegiance of his kingdom to Babylon. During the reigns of Josiah, Jehoshaphat, Jehoiakim, Jehoiachin until the days of Zedekiah, covering the period between 638 B. C. and 586 B. C.  
 According to Professor Torczyner potsherds are likely to throw extraordinary light on the existing knowledge of Jeremiah's time. The starkey discovery represents one of the few extrabiblical documents on scripture. No archaeologist had believed that the humid earth of Palestine would be able to preserve any document through the centuries, although the dry sand of Egypt had caused the preservation of a number of important writings.  
 Professor Torczyner is now engaged in preparing a lecture on the significance of the find conjointly with Dr. Starkey, head of the expedition, which is financed by Sir Henry Wellcome of London. The lecture is scheduled for April 26.  
 The possibility that the potsherds

would reveal many episodes in the heroic history of Lachish was forecast by several authorities who have examined the potsherds. Lachish was the city to which Amaziah, king of Judah, fled when a conspiracy was raised against him in Jerusalem following his disastrous war against Jehoash, king of Israel. The conspirators followed and assassinated him in Lachish, as the story is told in second Kings. This was in the middle of the eighth century, B. C.  
 It was at Lachish also that Sennacherib, king of Assyria, encamped when he was waiting for the surrender of King Hezekiah at Jerusalem during the days of the Prophet Isaiah.
