Chapter One "LITTLE JAMES"

THERE were three James Brewster Stimsons. The third James had a great deal to live up to. Not only was he the grandson of New Concord's only ex-governor and most eminent citizen...

Everyone in New Concord suspected, and all the women knew positively, that this paragon, Dr. Jim Stimson, the second James, had refused to be vaccinated during the smallpox epidemic in 1853 because he could not bear to go on living after the death of his wife, Molly. Molly died in giving birth to the third James.

Probably no little orphan was ever more tenderly loved and cherished. The night of his father's funeral Sarah, his grandmother, said to her husband, "The tenderness of God has left us little James."
