DENVER, Colo., March 20.—(AP)—The surviving field of 16 in the National A. U. basketball tournament squared away for the third-round tests today with all eight seeded teams still in the scramble for the title.

The defending champions, exorcised from the first round competition along with all but one of the official favorites, cleared the initial hurdle last night with an easy 35-25 victory over Colorado college.

They are matched in the final third round tonight with the Jones state team of Kansas City, which had a struggle with the Durant (Okla.) Teachers before winning a 38-34 victory in the final moments of their second round clash.
