

### 3 SPECIAL TRAINS TO TAKE CCC MEN HOME THIS MONTH

The first of three special trains carrying CCC members to the middle west for discharge will leave Medford Saturday, March 23, commanded by Major Clara H. Armstrong, district commander.

The three trains will carry members who do not wish to enroll for the fifth CCC period. The first train will take about 175 men, 85 of whom will be from Camp China Plate and 125 from Camp Sebastian. Major Armstrong will be accompanied by First Lieut. Roy W. Oms, Cav. Reg., as mess officer, and First Lieut. Frank L. Hoagland, Med. Res., as medical officer. The train will take the men to Fort Sheridan, Ill., for discharge.

The second of the special trains will leave here March 25, commanded by Captain Chauncey L. Pierce, with Capt. John B. Murray as mess officer, and Captain Andley C. Joslyn as medical officer.

The train will carry 377 men from the following companies: Humboldt Mountain, 86; McKinley, 67; Oregon Caves, 85; South Fork, 84; and Rand, 53. The men will be discharged at Fort Sheridan.

The third train will leave March 26 for Fort Crook, Neb., and Fort Sheridan, Ill. The officers to accompany the train have not yet been named. It will carry 409 men from the following companies: Selad, 70; Sitkum, 47; Coos Head, 74; Wolf Creek, 75; Clear Creek, 88; and Steamboat, 87.

President Roosevelt's recovery program in face of threats that he would be "elected to stay home in 1936" if he failed to vote for either the Patman or Vinson bonus bill.

He added he would be pleased to

vote for a bill providing for bonus payments to unemployed veterans, but expressed fear the government's credit would be impaired by adding another two billion dollars to the national debt.

A "compromise" proposal was Representative McReynolds (Dem., Tenn.), close friend of the administration, whose bill was drafted by the veterans administration.

A quorum call had filled the floor when McReynolds arose to discuss his plan, under which negotiable, interest-bearing bonds would be exchanged for the adjusted compensation certificates which veterans now hold.

PARIS, March 21.—(AP)—The publication of "Agence Economique," a leading French commercial agency, published a sensational and uncorroborated account today of a purported memorandum submitted to President Roosevelt in which an early economic collapse in Germany was forecast and the advisability of closing all American business houses in that country discussed.

(American officials in London characterized the alleged report as "just another unfounded war scare story." It was officially denied that any American had gone to Berlin from London to collaborate in such a memorandum as the Paris report said.)

The main headings of the memorandum were reported to be as follows:

1. No peaceful evolution is possible in Germany.
2. The next government will last several years.
3. The financial and economic collapse of Germany is in sight.
4. The supply of raw materials will become increasingly scarce.
5. Confiscation of industrial capital is to be feared.
6. Should American business houses in Germany be closed?
7. The actual resources of Germany are too small for her present population.
8. War in central Europe is a possibility.

The financial situation of the German government is desperate," the memorandum was quoted as saying.

The beginnings of economic collapse were foreseen in the story in April owing to lack of raw materials and expenditures on raw materials.

The roads are still slick there, however, and motorists are advised to carry chains both there and over Oregon mountain between Grants Pass and Crescent City. Between 18 inches and two feet of snow was reported on the summit of Oregon mountain yesterday.

According to the authorities on the subject, the storm has not yet broken, and more snow is apt to fall in the higher regions at any time.

PORTLAND, Ore., March 21.—(AP)—The astronomers were satisfied that spring arrived quite on schedule at 8:18 a. m. today, but the man on the street was beset by pardonable perplexity.

In very few places within Oregon's wide confines this morning could there be found much evidence of other than a nominal change in seasons. Winter's snow had gathered in big drifts in many sections of the state and icy temperatures prevailed.

"Unsettled tonight and Friday with rain in west portion and snow in east portion," read the weather bureau report, and it added succinctly "continued cold."

The Pacific northwest remained unreasonably chilly with considerable new snow in all higher elevations.

Today was the date of the vernal equinox, and the earth was at right angles to the sun and day and night was of equal duration. In the southern hemisphere autumn has arrived and while we in the north look forward to summer, those below the equator will soon be preparing for winter.

### CONVICTS ESCAPE PLOT IS FOILED

LANESING, Kan., March 21.—(UP)—Five desperate convicts were in solitary confinement at the state penitentiary here today after a wholesale delivery plot to blow up the prison walls had been uncovered and a cache of arms, ammunition and explosives had been found just outside the walls.

Warden Lacy M. Simpson declined to name the convicts implicated.

The arms cache included three pistols, a sawed-off shotgun, ammunition and a quantity of dynamite.

"We learned that the plan was to blow up a section of the prison wall and liberate all those who wanted to flee," Simpson said.

The window was smashed.

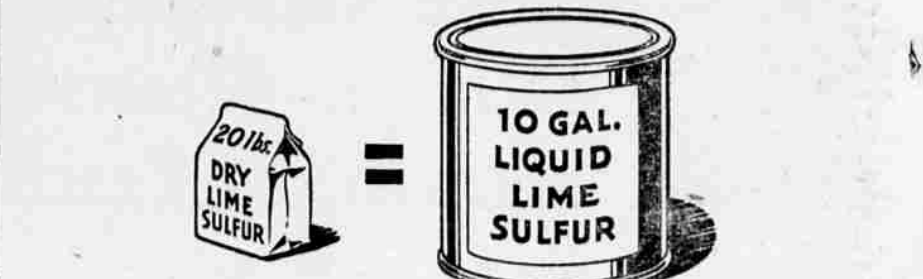
