

Newcomer Grapplers Will Show Wares in Tonight's Armory Show

PEREIRA, COLUMBO IN FIRST BOW TO LOCAL MAT FANS

Portuguese Will Meet Popular Jim Healy—Columbo of Italy Will Meet Big Hans Schultz of Germany

In contrast to the last wrestling card at the Armory, which ended with a score of highly indignant fans inside the ring as a result of going a little too far in the way of roughness, the grip and grapple show at the Armory tonight promises two bouts of scientific wrestling.

In the opening event Al Pereira of Portugal, 215 pounds, will make his first appearance here in a 60-minute tussle with Jim Healy of San Francisco, a recent find of Promoter Mack Lillard's and as popular a grappler as ever dusted off the Armory mat.

Healy wrestles in a business-like way that goes over with the fans, only resorting to unsportsmanlike work when he wants to finish something his opponent has started. Although the Portuguese outwrestles him a few pounds, the San Franciscan is a burly specimen himself, but not the big, cumbersome type that usually puts on a slow match. Healy is noted for his speed and for his wide variety of clever holds.

The man from Portugal is rated among the best in the game and although he has never appeared in Medford has been a great drawing card in other coast wrestling centers. Promoter Lillard has arranged a natural by pitting these two boys, as they use the same tactics and are on a par in size.

The second bout will probably see even more scientific matwork, that is if Hans Schultz, big German bone-bender, who is featured as another local favorite, contains himself and is satisfied in using the many spectacular scientific tricks of which he is capable. If he does, this bout should furnish the best slant on scientific wrestling in some time, as Schultz has been matched against Casey Columbo of Italy, who, unlike most Italian grapplers, believes in keeping the sport on the up and up.

Columbo, also brand new to Medford, is in Promoter Lillard's opinion one of the big-time wrestlers of the day. His scientific matwork has made him another big drawing card on the Pacific coast, where there has been an influx of mat-men in the last several months. He weighs well over the 200-pound mark, making him all the more formidable, for science and strength combined is a combination hard to stop.

Schultz is a bit inclined to be belligerent, but is capable of a good, clean performance. He is another big follow of unusual strength, employing headlocks as a specialty.

Promoter Lillard announced that one of the winners of tonight's matches may have the opportunity of meeting Masked Marvel, who caused the riot two weeks ago, in a near-future match, as the boxing commission is seriously considering withdrawing the ban they put on the Marvel after his last appearance.

The promoter says tickets are selling fast for the show tonight, and indications are that there will be a big house. Fireman Ray Frisbie will referee.

Howell Leaves Game On Fouls — Patterson and McLean Aid Scoring — Seattle Italians Surprise

DENVER, Mar. 21.—(AP)—Southern Oregon Normal's basketball team faded from the basketball picture here yesterday when the Hutchinson, Kan., Transits gained the quarter-final round of the annual A. A. U. tournament with a 51 to 29 victory over the Oregonians.

The SON's scoring aces were held scoreless from the field, although Ward Howell, forward-center alternate, connected for five gift tosses before being retired on fouls and Charley Patterson, negro center garnered three. Chief McLean, Indian forward scored three goals from the field.

The Transits took the game in hand from the start and were leading 35 to 15 at halftime.

A courageous late rally sparked by sharpshooting Ben Seizer and climaxed by the last-minute goal of the veteran Carl Larson won the defending champion Tulsa Oilers a berth in the quarter finals.

With Coach Bill Miller's 1933 and 1934 champions, six other seeded teams and the darkhorse Italian athletic club of Seattle progressed through the third round yesterday.

Italian A. C. sprang the only major upset of the tournament before a crowd of 4900 in city auditorium by checking out the Utah State Aggies, last of the 20 college teams to be eliminated. The Aggies, handpicked by the lax of Captain Cleo Petty who hobbled to the game on crutches as a result of a knee injury suffered in the second round Tuesday, were beaten by 34-28.

While the Rocky Mountain collegiate champions' ouster stunned the fans, the hair-raising 31-30 Oiler victory over Jones State of Kansas City laid them in a panic.
