assured Sir John, in answer to the latter's question, that Germany has no design upon Soviet Russia.

Sir John was obviously pleased at Hitler's assurance of Germany's pacific intentions in eastern Europe.

Return Surprise

He therefore gave Hitler a return surprise present by a positive assurance that while Great Britain was welcoming a pact of non-aggression between the eastern powers of Europe he did not deem it necessary that the signatories pledge themselves to mutual assistance.

By this time both sides were in such good humor that Hitler not only asked the British envoys to have luncheon in the chancellery but Lady Phipps, wife of Ambassador Sir Eric Phipps of Great Britain, was hastily summoned to join the conferees at the meal.

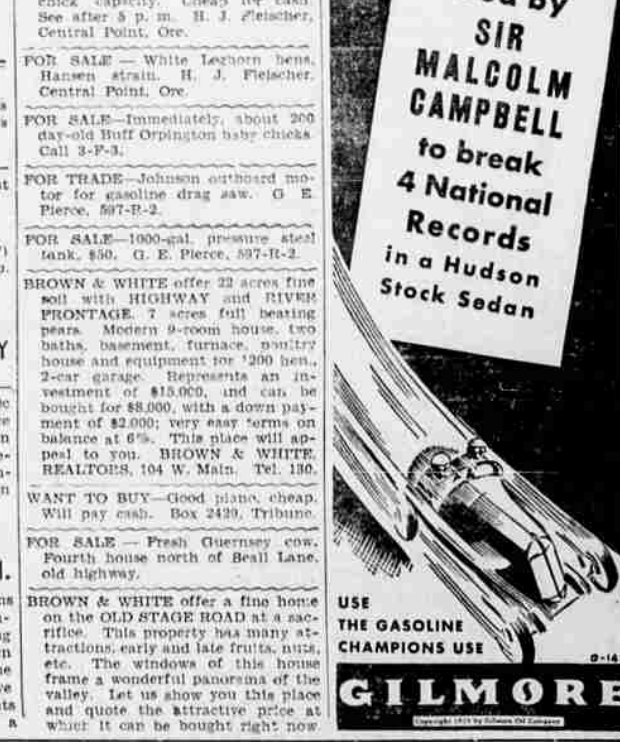
