through congress, though many a battle appears in the offing.

Speaker Byrnes predicted that "the home will go along as it has in carrying out that legislative program."

It was drawn up in a conference between the president and Senator Robinson, Democratic leader. Though it was emphasized that the calendar was not a "hard and fast" one and was to be flexible enough to permit the possible inclusion of other bills, these measures were listed as among those which will be considered with a view to final action.

NRA extension, social security (both old age pensions and unemployment insurance), regulation of utility holding companies, increased capitalization for the home owners' loan corporation, consolidated transportation regulation, a banking act increasing powers of the federal reserve board over credit and currency and tightening of food and drug laws.

Wood Postpone Bonus

The capital noted with interest that several controversial measures were not listed.

Through Senator Robinson, the president left word in Washington that he would like the \$2,000,000,000 bonus question to be postponed until he returns from his vacation.

The legislative program which Mr. Roosevelt worked out with Senator Robinson was described as a list which would satisfy the administration if congress adjourned without acting upon anything else.

The Wagner labor disputes bill to outlaw company-dominated unions was not mentioned by Robinson, but a prediction came from leaders of the American Federation of Labor that the administration will support that measure.

Ahead of the vacation lay a week, perhaps two, of deep sea fishing on the yacht *Norholm* of Vincent Astor, a distant relative, who is publisher of the magazine "Today."

MERRIAM'S SUCCESSOR AS LEGISLATOR WILL BE NAMED SATURDAY

SALEM, Ore., March 26.—(AP) The Lane county court will be called into session next Saturday by Secretary of State Earl Snell to appoint a successor to Howard Merriam, representative in the state legislature from Lane county who was recalled last week.

Two statutes, one on the books for some time and the second just passed by the 1935 legislature, provide for immediate filling of any office vacated by recall.

The vote on Merriam's recall was canvassed today by the secretary of state, in the presence of the governor. The official vote was 7984 for the recall and 4464 against. The recall movement was taken by Townsend clubs on the grounds that Merriam did not vote "wholeheartedly" for the Townsend old age pension plan.

Colleagues of Merriam in the legislature considered the Lane county man one of the best members of the house, and so expressed themselves during the session.
