LETTERS OF PIONEER OREGONIAN FOUND IN REED COLLEGE CACHE

PORTLAND, Ore., March 28.—(AP)—The discovery of documents which should be of great importance in the study of the history of the Pacific northwest was revealed by officials of Reed college here today.

The author of the documents was Simon G. Reed, from whose fortune came the funds with which the college was founded. Included are nearly all letters written by Reed from 1868 to 1889, as well as many letters to him. Several boxes of the letters and documents were found stored away under the floor of one of the classrooms.

Described by Dr. Blair Stewart, assistant professor of economics at Reed college, as "one of the most outstanding and colorful characters of the pioneer era," Reed apparently had an interest in practically every important industry in early Oregon except banking. He made most of his money in mining, but probably is best known for his connection with the Oregon Steam Navigation company, of which he was manager. He was one of the outstanding breeders of fine cattle and horses in Oregon, owning 14 farms, many of them of considerable size. He dealt extensively in real estate.

PORTLAND, Ore., March 28.—(AP)—Traders here revealed today that the remaining stock of No. 1 onions at Willamette valley points is being held generally at \$5 net to growers, but that no business has been confirmed at that price.

Local supplies were exceedingly scant and bidding values were up to \$5.50 for the best stock available. It was said not more than 10 to 12 cars remain unsold in growers' hands in Oregon. Nearly all the late trade in consuming channels has been by speculators from storage stock.
