## HIGHWAY SIGNBOARDS TO BE DISCOURAGED ASSERTS COMMISSION

PORTLAND, Ore., March 29.—(AP)—Policy of the state highway commission against "defacing" scenery along the state highway was reiterated at the meeting of the section here late yesterday when protests against new signboards being placed along the Oregon Coast highway and the Umpqua highway were brought to the attention of the commission. Although the commission is without authority to prohibit signs along the highways when of fine right of way, the policy of discouraging such practice has met with public favor, members announced, and every effort will be made toward keeping the highways clear of sign boards. The matter was brought to the fore when the commission was informed many letters had been received the past few weeks from residents and civic organizations in southwestern Oregon protesting recently erected sign boards along the two highways. The letters were retained for future disposal.

## ASK MORE MONEY FOR VET BUILDING

PORTLAND, Ore., March 29.—(AP)—A special dispatch to the Journal today from Washington, D. C., said: "Senator Steiwer was advised today that the director of construction of the veterans' administration has requested an appropriation of \$17,000 additional for the recreation building at the Roseburg soldiers' home." The dispatch said this would permit construction under the lowest bid of \$122,000 recently received for this work. "It is understood," the article continued, "that General Hines, director of veterans' affairs, has authority with approval of the president to add the \$17,000 to the \$105,000 already available and thus proceed with the project."

## HOUSING SITUATION TALKED BY REALTORS

Matters pertaining to the housing situation in Medford were discussed at the regular meeting of Southern Oregon Realty board today at Hotel Jackson, and it was found that an acute situation exists, in that there is very little property for rent in Medford. The board is making an effort to have owners of vacant properties list them with downtown realtors for the benefit of newcomers. A discussion on legislation affecting real estate was also held, in which it was brought out that the bond requirement has been cut from \$2000 to \$1000, and the premium cut in half.
