

### CARROLL UP FOR SENTENCE MONDAY CLEMENCY URGED

#### Advisory Jury Also Recommends Revocation of Driver's License for Five Years and Given Suspended Term.

Sentence will be passed tomorrow morning upon Roster P. (Red) Carroll, service station worker, who entered a plea of guilty to an involuntary manslaughter indictment growing out of the death of June Rose Hansen, 15, following an auto crash February 2 last, on West Main street.

The advisory jury called by the court returned an unqualified recommendation late Friday afternoon that Carroll be given a suspended sentence, and that his auto driver's license be revoked for a five-year period.

The advisory jury impaneled by the court to advise with him in fixing a sentence and degree of clemency to be extended Carroll was composed as follows:

Petitions signed by members of the grand jury that returned the indictment against Carroll, and the coroner's jury that investigated the tragedy, urging that he not be given a state prison term were presented to the advisory jury by the court.

Testimony at the advisory hearing was given by the parents of June Rose Hansen, her brother, Chief of Police C. C. McCreedy, Paul Jennings, the defendant, C. C. Barnes, his employer and Robert Walker and William Minear, two small boys, who were close to the scene of the accident on West Main street when it occurred.

Photographs and a map of the accident were also presented to the jury.

Questioning of the witnesses was conducted by the court.

### NAME TOWNSEND ADVOCATE TO SEAT RECALLED SOLON

EUGENE, Ore., March 30.—(AP)—James A. McKeivitt, for many years manager of the Western Union here but now retired on company pension, has been named successor to Howard Merriam, recalled member of the Lane county delegation in the legislature. Mr. McKeivitt is a Republican and an ardent supporter of the Townsend plan. The county court declared the choice a logical one. Though the courts is solidly Democratic, it held that a Republican should succeed the recalled Republican, especially since the Democrats have one legislative member, C. P. Hyde. The choice of an avowed Townsender was advocated by the Registrar-Guard, chief opponent of the Merriam recall.

The paper contended the 7000 recall voters indicated an obvious mandate for direct representation of the Townsends in proportion. The county court recognized this view. McKeivitt and C. A. Patne, organizer of the Townsend clubs here, expressed satisfaction with the appointment. Business men and leaders in both political parties also commended the court.

### BURN TRASH NOW SAYS FIRE CHIEF

Fire Chief Roy Elliott yesterday issued a statement to the people of Medford to do their trash burning now, while the grass is still green, to forestall the necessity and danger of letting the stuff accumulate until after the dry season sets in.

A large number of the calls answered by the fire department are during the summer and fall, when careless people start grass fires while burning trash. No permit is needed, the chief said, to burn trash at this time of year. An announcement will be made in this paper when the practice becomes unsafe.

### CLEANING FIRMS INCREASE RATES

Members of the Medford Cleaning and Dyeing association agreed to increase charges on all cleaning and dyeing 25 per cent, following a meeting of the group Saturday.

Patrons who pay on delivery, or within ten days, will be granted a 20 per cent cash discount. The change in prices was necessitated by increase in production cost. NEW YORK, March 30.—(AP)—Clara L. Palmer, widow, of 1800 Euclid avenue, Ashland, Ore., is named residuary legatee of the estate of Henry H. Palmer whose will was filed Friday. The estate is formally valued at more than \$20,000.

Personal and household effects real estate in Kansas and Oregon and a succeeding income from New York city real estate were also bequeathed to the widow.

### FLIER FORCED DOWN SOUTH OF ASHLAND

ASHLAND, Ore., March 30.—(Sp.)—Illmer Anderson, Spokane aviator, was forced to land in an alfalfa field near the overhead crossing on the highway south of here Friday about 2:30 p. m., when the rocker assembly on his tiny two-cylinder plane became disabled. Anderson, was en route from Oakland, where he had purchased the machine, to his home in Spokane, and the engine trouble developed as he was crossing the Sitkious. Poor visibility added to the flier's trouble in negotiating the mountain ridge but the landing in the rough field was made with no greater trouble than a severe jarring up.

The plane was taken to Medford airport for repairs.

### IMPROVEMENTS IN SNIDER'S DAIRY NEAR COMPLETION

Cost of Expansion Program \$40,000—Added Space, Improved Facilities—Mrs. Maud Snider Proprietor

At an estimated cost of \$40,000, improvements at the Snider Dairy and Produce company which have been underway for the past five months will be completed by April 15, according to plans.

The entire plant has been re-built gradually while the business was operated as usual and the space now occupied by the Snider company is 75 by 120 feet. Local materials and labor were used throughout. White cement and stainless steel equipment in the milk department give it an appearance of sanitary modernness. Practically all of the side facing North Central is window space, providing ample light.

All equipment in the bottling room is stainless steel including a 350-gallon vat for pasteurizing. The check-room adjoins the milk department and main office. Mrs. Snider's office is elevated above the larger one and attractive furniture and equipment has been installed in both.

New cream vats have been secured for the large butter room which has all cement walls. One of the most interesting and up-to-date additions at Snider's is an ice-cream "Tunnel," the only one in operation in Oregon. It provides simplified and rapid freezing.

### A Red Diamond bottler has been installed in the soda pop department and Snider's will now bottle their own lime rocky, ginger ale and other soft drinks.

Five new refrigeration rooms, including milk, butter, two ice-cream rooms and one for beer, are air-conditioned by a Carrie Brunswick metal chloride compressor. There are very few of these systems in use in Oregon outside of Portland.

Snider Dairy and Produce company was organized in 1904 on a very small scale and it has steadily grown until it now has one of the finest dairy plants in this part of the state, and its payroll is one of the largest in Medford.

The dairy is under the management of Mrs. Maud Snider with the cooperation of 27 unusually loyal and efficient employees.

"The Oregon Woolen Mills has no authorized agent selling their products at cut prices. Portland Better Business Bureau has record of individual who is misrepresenting woolen industry. If you can furnish us name of imposter we will give you complete information to end his racket."

The chamber yesterday warned all households to be on the lookout for the man, and if he contacts their homes, to get in touch immediately with either the police or the chamber of commerce.
