

LAST APPEAL FOR STUDENT FEES IS MADE AT COLLEGE

COOVALLES, Ore., April 1.—(AP)—All student activities at Oregon State college which are dependent upon student body funds for their support were suspended Sunday until next Wednesday, following a special meeting of the student-faculty board of control, which found that funds received so far this term from the sale of student body memberships were not sufficient to maintain student activities.

If after the temporary suspension, funds collected by six o'clock Wednesday night are not sufficient to support the student program, all student activities will be suspended for the entire term. It was announced at the conclusion of the meeting, Spring football and all other athletic training programs will be abandoned as a result of the board's action today, Carl Ledell, graduate manager, announced.

Only 473 student body memberships have been sold thus far in the term, out of a student enrollment of approximately 3900.

The staff of the Oregon State Barometer, school publication, was called together at the conclusion of the board of control meeting this afternoon and asked to issue a special edition tomorrow morning, warning students at the institution of the board's decision.

Student body funds already collected will be refunded if memberships sold by Wednesday night are not sufficient to support the student activities.

NEGRO LOSES IN TEXAS VOTE BAN

WASHINGTON, April 1.—(AP)—The method employed in Texas to bar negroes from voting at Democratic primaries by restricting membership in the party to whites was sustained today by the supreme court.

The action of the Texas Democratic convention in May, 1932, in limiting party members to white citizens qualified to vote under state laws, was challenged by R. H. Grovey, a 44-year-old Harris county negro.

In 1932 the supreme court declared invalid a Texas statute which prohibited negroes from voting at Democratic elections. Since then the same results have been sought by action of the Democratic party organization.

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FIRST SPRAY FOR PEAR SCAB CURB SCHEDULED SOON

The first of a series of sprays for control of pear scab will be due shortly and growers who have such a problem to contend with are advised to be prepared and follow the recommended program as herein outlined, states County Agent L. P. Wilcox.

Scab is a fungus disease that attacks fruit, twigs and foliage of both apple and pear. Certain orchards during the past few seasons have suffered severe crop losses from the disease and in these cases control measures are deemed essential.

Prevention of infections is the key to successful scab control and in order to do this, fungicidal sprays must be applied at definite times during the early stages of bud and fruit development.

The recommended program is as follows:

1. As the cluster buds separate and prior to bloom, use liquid lime sulfur, 3 1/2 gallons to the 100 gallons of water.
2. When 80 to 95 percent of flower petals have fallen; liquid lime sulfur, 2 1/2 gallons to the 100 gallons of water.
3. Fifteen days after petals have fallen or with first cover spray for worm control; liquid lime sulfur, 2 gallons to the 100 gallons of water.

Smooth skin varieties of pears such as Comice and D'Anjou may be treated by the second and third sprays given above. Soluble sulfur sprays, 6 to 10 pounds to the 100 gallons of water may be substituted for the liquid lime sulfur in case of these varieties and applications respectively. Casein sprayers, one half pound per 100 gallons used with either liquid lime sulfur or soluble sulfur may aid in reducing the amount of fruit russet.

HERDER OF REINDEER BACK TO CIVILIZATION SILENT, NEARLY DEAF

EDMONTON, Alta., April 1.—(AP)—Silent, almost dumb and certainly hard of hearing after five years in the fastnesses of the far north, Andrew Bahr, 70-year-old reindeer herder returned to the support of civilization yesterday like "a man from another world."

And by special dispensation, which opened a clothing store and a shoe store on the Sabbath, Edmonton saw him transformed into "a man of the world."

At the Edmonton airport, Andy stepped out of an airplane plumed south by Archie McMullen. And for the first time since he started a trek across Alaska with a reindeer herd for the hungry Eskimos, Andy saw a city—a white man's city of modern homes, streets, motor cars, electric cars and plumbing.

The little, stooped man—almost as broad as he is tall—had completed a task well nigh epic, driving 3000 reindeer 1800 miles along the ice-ribbed Arctic coast to the new reindeer reserve east of the Mackenzie delta, established by Canada for its impoverished natives.
