

# CARROLL RECEIVES PEN TERM, PAROLE FOR FATAL CRASH

(Continued from Page One)

The court will only partially follow the recommendations of the advisory jury, said Judge Norton, "and the court feels that there is sufficient criminal culpability in this case to warrant the imposition of a prison sentence. The grand jury recommended, in a private letter, that Carroll be not given a prison sentence. The coroner's jury recommended the same thing. The court is bound to show regard for the recommendations of law enforcing bodies. The court is not inclined to heed petitions. Anybody will sign one. They mean nothing. The court called the advisory jury to get a cross-section of public opinion."

Photographs taken after the accident, the court said, indicated "left wheel of Carroll's auto had been momentarily caught in the rail slot of the old street car track, and had prevented him from missing the rear of the Hansen auto. The court said this was one extenuating circumstance."

Counter-balancing this, the court said, "the condition of the two autos, and the distance they travelled after the crash, show conclusively that Carroll was driving at an excessive and negligent rate of speed."

The court further stated the records show Carroll had been convicted in justice court of speeding, in the same area in which the tragedy occurred.

The court suggested to Carroll that he make an effort to help pay the expenses incurred by the Hansen family, as a result of the accident, and added: "We will see what you do about that."

The auto crash, around which the case revolved, occurred about ten o'clock at night, February 9, last, on West Main street near Quince street, when the auto driven by Carroll crashed into the rear end of an auto driven by Mrs. C. A. Hansen of the Oak Grove district, in which members of the Hansen family were returning home from this city.

June Rose Hansen, 13, sustained injuries from which she died, and other members of the family were also injured. The father recently filed a civil suit against Carroll for approximately \$8000 alleged damages, and the action is now pending.
