CULBERTSONS FAR AHEAD AS MATCH HALF COMPLETED

Simmes Score Net Gain of 1880 Points in Yesterday's Bridge Play — New Challenge Is Issued

NEW YORK, April 4.—(AP)—The Simmes-Culbertson bridge match reaches the half-way mark today with Elv and Josephine Culbertson on the long end of the score by 3,460 points.

This was the margin over Mr. and Mrs. Hal Sims at the end of 70 rubbers in the 150-rubber match that is supposed to decide the superiority of one or the other of their systems of bidding.

Honors in yesterday's play went to Hal and Dorothy Sims who made a net gain of 1,880 points and at one time had reduced their opponents' lead nearly 4,000. At the end of the 64th rubber, the Culbertsons' advantage was 12,920 points. Then the Sims swept through four rubbers and brought the difference down to 9,070, only to lose part of the gain on the next rubber.

The rubber score stands 39 to 31 in favor of the Culbertsons, with a total point score of 61,250 to 51,780.

Among a large group at Crookford's club last night was Lieutenant Governor Lee Canzort of Arkansas.

Injected into the match yesterday was a challenge from the "Four Aces" bridge team of Michael T. Gottlieb, David Burnstine, Howard Schenken and Oswald Jacoby. They offered to play Sims and Culbertson, with their wives or others as partners, in a 300-rubber team-of-four match for another test of bidding systems.

Both Sims and Culbertson turned down the challenge. Culbertson called it a "psychic bid for publicity."

As the match reaches the half-way point, the honor count shows the opposing sides almost even in the number of aces. In 428 hands, the Sims have held 831 aces, 873 kings and 829 queens, while the Culbertsons have had 841 aces, 819 kings and 883 queens.

NATURALIST COMMENDS MALE PIGEON'S MORALS

BAYTOWN, Tex.—(UP) Cyril Peacor, naturalist, commends the male pigeon's morals, and to keep himself occupied he tends his pigeons, score of beehives, gold fish, fruit trees and flower and vegetable gardens.

In the past 25 years he has become an authority on pigeons.

He has observed that, once mated, pigeons never desert, although some "female pigeons strut around." The male bird is religiously true to his mate.

"Another thing I've found out is that the birds take regular shifts on the egg," Peacor said.

The male's hours are 10 a. m. to 4 p. m. The female does the 18-hour trick.

lack of sympathy for any system designed to force an "iron ring" about Germany, remained uncertain.

Premier Mussolini, host to the conference, has let it be known Italy's attitude is that Stresa should mark the renunciation of the "dangerous Utopias of disarmament."

Soviet and Polish interest centers on the proposed eastern Locarno pact, now somewhat obscured by moves for a pan-European security arrangement.

Russia has strongly favored an eastern agreement, but Poland and Germany have remained cool, fearing it would lead to military entanglements.

Capt. Anthony Eden, arriving in Praha to confer with Czechoslovakia's statesmen, found the little entente attitude to be one of watchful waiting.

Austria, meanwhile, declared her intention of expanding her military forces despite limitations of the treaty of St. Germain.

SAVING AND LOAN ASSETS DIVIDED

SALEM, April 4.—(AP)—Distribution of approximately \$275,000 realized from the sale of assets of the Western Savings & Loan Association was started today by the corporation commissioner to 4500 shareholders of the company.

The sum will consummate negotiations of the association which was sold, with the approval of the circuit court of Multnomah county, to the Universal Bond & Mortgage Co. The payment will be on the basis of 17 1/2 cents on the dollar.

Corporation Commissioner Charles H. Carey urged that all shareholders send to the Portland office of the commission their certificates or pass books for verification of accounts due.
