The following was taken from an article appearing in the American

Legion Auxiliary Bulletin, entitled "Our Responsibility to These Children," by Mrs. Ralph C. Risch, chairman, national child welfare committee.

"The Legion seeks to care for, in every way possible, needy children of veterans and to improve conditions for all children by a three-phase program of education, legislation and emergency relief. Our first consideration is as it has always been, the children of the veterans. To take care of these children in the most intelligent manner it is advisable to cooperate with all community organizations and to tap all local resources. If these local facilities do not meet the needs it is apparent that some form of county or state aid must be solicited. At the present time many states also have federal funds which are available for unemployed veterans' families. Our second consideration is the children of the community and of the state. Together with other welfare groups we folks are seeking to improve conditions for all children and raise health standards by advocating the keeping of public health records. Our third consideration is to carry on this work for veterans' children and all children in the most intelligent manner possible. Our fourth consideration is to further promote the efficient service to our children by the Legion and Auxiliary child welfare groups always working as a coordinated committee. Our fifth consideration is to recognize the extent of our problem."
