COUNTY SEEKS COSTS OF EARL FEHL TRIAL

Jackson county, through the district attorney's office, has filed notice of garnishment against Earl H. Fehl, serving four years in state prison for ballot theft conviction, for \$992.30, the cost of his trial in Klamath county, on a charge of venue.

The county seeks recovery from the judgment awarded Fehl, against Niedermeyer, Inc., by the state supreme court.

Attorneys for Niedermeyer, Inc., in a reply, hold that the judgment is not subject to garnishment, and that no judicial decision on the creditors or the amount they are entitled to will be forthcoming until a ruling is made in the pending Niedermeyer, Inc., interpleader suit.

ITS STUFF USED ON POTATO THAT CAUSES FATNESS

CORVALLIS, Ore.—(Spl)—Are potatoes fattening? It depends upon how much rich gravy, butter or other fattening foods they are eaten with, says Miss Lucy Case, O. S. C. extension specialist in foods and nutrition.

Potatoes, because of their starch content, are often erroneously considered as one of the most fattening foods, and are usually the first to be omitted from a reducing diet. Scores of other foods may be more productive of plumpness, it seems.

The fattening quality of any food depends on the number of heat units, called calories, that it contains. Miss Case explains. All foods have calories, some more and some less. Fat, has nine calories per gram, and starch four, which means that fatty foods are more than twice as fattening as starchy foods such as potatoes. Starchy vegetables, of course, contain more calories than green and succulent vegetables, and the latter would consequently be used more generously in a reducing diet.

Comparing the calorie content of potatoes with some of the foods often substituted for them by those fearful of becoming overweight, Miss Case points out that it takes a five-ounce potato to make 100 calories, while it takes only one ounce shredded wheat biscuit, two Graham crackers, two ounces of hamburger steak, one-fourth cup (before cooking) of macaroni, or one-third cup or 3/4 ounces canned corn, Rich gravy, butter, cream, mayonnaise dressing or other fats added to any of these foods greatly increase the calorie content, however, Miss Case adds.

At meal time, a medium sized potato, seasoned with one-half tablespoon of butter, contains 150 calories, but a single piece of apple pie means 305 calories and if eaten with half a cup of ice cream or one-fourth cup of whipped cream, 200 more calories are added. A six-ounce serving of ham contains 400 calories, and a waffle with two tablespoons of butter and one-fourth cup of syrup on it contains 150 of these fat-producing units.

The between-meals nibbler gets 105 calories from three gumdrops, 110 from 10 salted almonds, 100 from 1 1/2 cups unbuttered popcorn, 100 from two caramels, 250 from a plain chocolate bar, 100 from a one-inch cube of fudge, 195 from a doughnut, 485 from a chicken sandwich and 350 to 500 from an ice-cream sundae.

drowning of a Santa Monica fire captain who had responded to a rescue call, and flooded the basements of scores of homes in scattered lowland points.

Despite a forecast of continued rains today and tonight, with clearing weather tomorrow, the county flood control headquarters reported there was no serious threat because of recently built debris basins in the foothills surrounding Los Angeles.

Capt. Fred W. Toenjes, 35, perished when he fell from a bridge into a storm drain and was knocked unconscious. He had gone to the rescue of two men and two women marooned in a stalled automobile. Two other firemen fell into the torrent when the bridge broke. They rescued themselves.

The storm, which began with a gentle drizzle Sunday morning, reached a crescendo at midnight, and tapered off with the morning, brought 2.73 inches of rain to Los Angeles, making the season's total 21.15 inches against 14.44 inches last year and a normal of 14.09 inches. The total was the heaviest since 1913-1914, which has stood as the third wettest year in the 56 years records of the local weather bureau.

The county flood control reported that debris basins in the Montrose-La Cresscena area, scene of the disastrous New Year's day flood of a year ago, were holding back the waters from the hills, and that there was no immediate danger.

LIEN FILED FOR HOG PROCESS TAX

Notice of a tax lien has been filed by the Internal Revenue department against George High and Lou Steiner of Ashland, for \$83.19, and interest and penalty, amounting to \$7.59, allegedly due for hog process taxes for last October and November.

Notice of a lien against Virgie Miller, for retail liquor tax and special liquor excise tax for \$640.82, with interest and penalty, was also filed. Virgie Miller is now in California with kin, on a suspended sentence, following her plea of guilty to liquor violations last December. She was arrested with others in a clean-up of local liquor resorts, and granted leniency upon condition that she leave the state.

It was alleged that the Miller woman sold liquor without federal license.

a man to help them in their work. When after a month they had not returned, Jenkins became alarmed, and notified the Ashland city police, who in turn notified the state police here.

One factor that leads the authorities to believe that the pair became lost is the fact that of the six feet of snow on the ground at the time they were last seen, the top two feet were very soft, making difficult skiing conditions. Starting on the 9th of March, the day after the two were last seen, a heavy snowstorm set in, raging for almost ten days.

It is impossible to get a car within 15 or 16 miles of Buck Lake from the Dead Indian side, state police said today, but it is believed possible to drive to within four or five miles of the spot via the Spencer creek road in Klamath county, so the party will head in from that side.

Tom Culbertson, manager of the municipal airport here, planned on making a survey of the territory by air this afternoon, if the weather permitted. Bad weather that prevailed through yesterday and this morning would make visibility so poor that it would be impossible to see tracks or other signs if the bad weather held, Culbertson stated. He intended flying directly to Buck Lake, and look for signs of smoke, he said.

Timber cruisers believed to be in the neighborhood will be contacted as soon as possible for possible information it was stated.
