

GEN. LUDENDORFF LAYS WAR DEFEAT ON CHRISTIANITY

Military Hero Proudly Styles Self a Heathen — Considers Limitation of Armament As Immoral

LONDON, Eng., April 9.—(AP) The Munich correspondent of Reuters reports that Gen. Erich Ludendorff, breaking a long silence on the eve of his 70th birthday, proudly styled himself "an anti-Christian and a heathen" and placed the blame on Christianity for Germany's collapse in 1918.

The general, in an interview in his small villa in the Bavarian village of Tutzing, was quoted as saying: "Only through the complete renunciation of Christianity will the German people achieve the unity it needs and which would have saved it from the trying days of 1918."

Talks of Moral Right The Reuters correspondent said the general spoke lengthily of Germany's "moral right" to rearm and of his own "war" on Christianity. "We were beaten in 1918, it is true," but never did our enemy have the moral justification to take from us our moral right to fulfill our great moral obligations toward our own people—the obligation to rearm.

Conscription Means Peace "When compulsory military education of every German citizen actually has been carried out, then peace will be maintained as a natural consequence. "We only were able to be attacked in 1914," Ludendorff continued, "because the foreign powers knew Germany had not made complete use of its military strength—that more than 5,000,000 able-bodied men had never been given military training before the war started."
