

COUNTY PREPARES TO START OILING RURAL HIGHWAYS

Jackson county is now making preliminary preparations for the launching of its 1935 road oiling program, and to that end have been operating road equipment for the past week putting roads in shape for the administering of the oil. It is a part of a cooperative five-year oiling program inaugurated by the county court, for which a \$10,000 appropriation was made in the last budget.

In the Table Rock district the Table Rock store has been moved across the road, eliminating a dangerous intersection, and enabling the straightening of the road past the E. W. Carleton orchard. The Modoc orchard has submitted its check for the oiling of the road from this point to their building.

Oiling of the Taylor road from Central Point to the Old Stage road will also be started at an early date. It is one of the heaviest travelled rural roads in the county.

In all these three jobs, the expense of oiling is shared equally by the county and residents along the routes.

County Judge Day said today that ten districts of the county would be oiled this year for short stretches, and would cover the entire county. Oiling costs about \$1000 per mile.

"Oiling this year will just be a start," County Judge Day stated. By doing a little each year, in five years the county will have something to show for its oiling. At the same time, the county is saving the roads in which it has a heavy investment. Oiling preserves the road base and prevents deterioration under fast and heavy travel. The county is willing and anxious to cooperate on a 50-50 basis, with any district desiring oiling.

"The oiling will also keep down the dust in the summer time, and be welcomed by every rural housewife."

again with Secretary Perkins on the situation in the rubber industry where a strike has been threatened. He declined comment on agitation for new silver legislation.

Spends Busy Day

In later afternoon, the executive settled down to one of his busiest days in recent weeks. The schedule called for conferences with a number of his cabinet. One, with Secretary Hull, was for the purpose of discussing a new neutrality plan for the United States in event of war abroad.

It was learned the White House hopes congress will enact all the new deal program at this session—including NRA's extension and the social security bill.

Meanwhile, Robert Fechner, director of the CCC, announced that 187 new camps would be built to care for the existing enrollment. These

included 121 camps where men are housed in wooden huts, and 66 tents for summer use.

At present there are 1,640 CCC camps and movement from winter to summer quarters is to take place the coming month.

New camps included: Oregon, 15; Washington, 8; California, 3; Idaho, 20; Montana, 11.

BUTTE FALLS PIPE TO ARRIVE TODAY

First shipment of pipe for the Butte Falls water system improvement under a \$5000 PWA loan to the municipality is scheduled to arrive today from the Hillsboro, Oregon, plant of the Gates Pipe Co. Preliminary work on the project is now underway, and expected to be in full swing by early next week.

The project calls for replacement of the present wooden pipe of the Butte Falls system with steel pipe. Under terms of the contract residents of Butte Falls must be employed on the work, and federal employment rolls, were inspected today by Butte Falls officials and Contractor Stevens to procure names of those eligible.

The project is one of the first in the state to get underway, under a PWA loan for municipal betterment. Legal details of the agreement and contract were handled by Attorney Otto Frohmyer of this city.

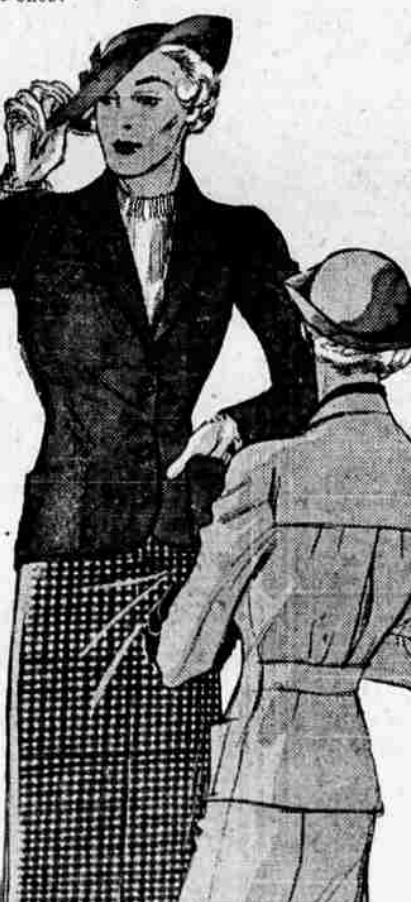
