JOE THOMAS OF SPEEDWAY FAME PASSES THROUGH

Joe Thomas, veteran automobile racing driver and one of the brilliant stars of the speedway for nearly a quarter of a century, visited Medford Tuesday evening on his economy run from the Canadian border to San Diego, California. Driving a stock Ford V-8 and using Gilmore gasoline and motor oil, the famous racing driver will demonstrate to prospective visitors to the San Diego exposition this summer how economically the trip may be made from various points on the Pacific coast. His present gasoline mileage figures 21.5 miles per gallon, with driving at the normal touring speed between 25 and 30 miles per hour.

Mr. Thomas started his run Monday at the Canadian border with an impressive ceremony attended by the prime minister of Canada, officials of the consular service, American and Canadian police and traffic officials, and scores of dignitaries.

He carries with him letters of greeting to the mayor of San Diego and officials of the exposition, from the prime minister of Canada, the governors of Oregon and Washington, and the mayors of Seattle, Tacoma and Portland. On his trip through California Mr. Thomas will visit Governor Merriam, and Mayor Ross of San Francisco. He will arrive in San Diego Thursday night.

Joe Thomas' career on the speedway and in the air has been a colorful one. He first began his automobile racing activities in 1912, and has held numerous world records from time to time. He has driven in races in every section of the United States over a period of 23 years, and his speedway activities were only interrupted during the World War, when he served as flying instructor in the United States air service. Daring stunts in moving pictures and doubling for such stars as Tom Mix lent variety to his racing activities.

FINAL TEST GIVEN HUGE AIR CLIPPER BEFORE EAST HOP

ALAMEDA, Cal., April 10.—(AP)—The big Pan-American clipper plane took off from here today in its final test flight over the ocean before flying to Honolulu to establish commercial air service to the Far East.

The plane will be directed completely by radio compass equipment and will fly approximately 1000 miles in a zig-zag course.

The ship lifted a load of 24,000 pounds, or 8000 more than it had taken aloft previously. It broke the weight lifting mark of 16,000 pounds carried by its sister ship, the Brazilian clipper, to a height of 6000 feet.

Nine persons were aboard the clipper, commanded by Captain Edwin C. Musick.

Weighing a gross 42,000 pounds, the plane, its four motors roaring, took off in 33 seconds after a run of 1800 feet.

It carried sufficient gasoline for a flight of 3200 miles.

Captain Musick headed the ship on a southerly course, climbed to 3000 feet and then to 7000 feet, where the engineers were to study the engine's superchargers.

The course of the clipper's flight was not announced.
