HAMILTON GIVES KIWANIS RESUME OF LEGISLATURE

Moore Hamilton, representative from Jackson county in the state legislative assembly, was the speaker at the noon luncheon today of Medford Kiwanis club, discussing highlights of the 1935 legislature and new legislation that was passed.

In his highly educational talk, Representative Hamilton said that the fact that no new taxes were levied this year was the greatest single accomplishment of the session.

He discussed revision of the present state government, explaining that the governor has appointed a commission to study the cabinet form. He said there are now 80 different boards and departments, which collect and spend forty million dollars, of which the governor has control of only seven million.

Explaining organization of the legislature, and the intricacies of the governmental system, he said the new interim committee, of which he is a member, is asking help of every organization in working out the many problems with which it is confronted.

In his talk he also discussed the Rogue river closure bill, the timber acquisition bill, the truck bill and the liquor bill.
