Tribune Tops All FHA Advertising Papers Of State

The Medford Mail Tribune lead all newspapers in Oregon in advertising space devoted to the Better Housing and Home Modernization program of the Federal Housing Administration, according to statistics made public this week by Media Records, Inc. Advertising lineages figures compiled by this firm for the Federal Housing Administration show that the Tribune published approximately two and one-half times the space devoted to home modernization of the next highest newspaper listed in daily editions—the Astoria-Budget. In Better Housing advertising published in Sunday editions, the Mail Tribune was exceeded only by the Oregon Journal of Portland. In total space in all editions The Mail Tribune's lineage was 13,296 agate lines with the Oregon Journal second with 5741 lines.

PRISONER SLAIN IN DASH FOR LIBERTY

PORT WORTH, Tex., April 15.—(AP)—Melvin Bowes, 33, a fugitive from the Florida state prison, was slain and two other prisoners were wounded today by Jail Guard Charles B. Miller during an attempted break of eight men from the Tarrant county jail. Clarence B. Billingsley, 23, a jockey held on charges of theft and burglary, and James Lawrence Kirk, scheduled for trial Thursday on robbery charges, were wounded. Eight prisoners had saved the bars of two cells, jailers said, and manipulated the combination of a master lock box to liberate 16 prisoners in the cell block. Eight prisoners, however, refused to leave their cells.
