

# HOOVER IN EFFORT REVITALIZE PARTY SAYS NEWSPAPER

WASHINGTON, April 15. (AP)—The Washington Post says former President Hoover on his recent travels about the country has been inspiring plans to revitalize the Republican party in advance of the 1936 campaign.

The apparent result, the paper adds, will be five regional conventions at which members of the G. O. P. will attack the new deal and adopt declarations of principles to provide the basis for next year's platform.

Regional meetings already have been arranged at Boston, Baltimore and Kansas City. Another has been proposed to get together the Republican leaders of Kentucky, West Virginia, Tennessee, Ohio, Wisconsin and Michigan. A fifth rally has been suggested in the far west.

Mr. Hoover's present efforts, according to his friends, do not necessarily imply that he is seeking another nomination, the Post says. "For the time being, he is concerned not so much about his own future as he is about the future of the party."

# MEDFORD RATES HIGH IN OREGON SURVEY OF MILK LAW COMPLIANCE

A recent issue of the Oregonian comments on the rating of all cities adopting the U. S. standard milk ordinance. Dr. Strickler, state health officer, is quoted as follows:

"A survey made last winter by M. M. Miller, milk specialist of the United States service, has just been returned to the state and city health officials, showing that Portland had attained the highest rating in the state, namely 92.8. Other ratings include Medford, 81.7; Salem, 73.0; Eugene, 58.3; Bend, 42.5; Roseburg, 40.0; Astoria, 34.9; Pendleton, 32.7.

Klamath Falls, 32.3; Baker, 30.0; McMinnville, 28.3."

Charles W. Austin, Medford milk inspector, states that, according to the tabulated list of this survey, Medford would have received a considerably higher rating had the lack of detailed authoritative records showing actual attendance of all retailers in T. B. and abortion tests.

"Hereafter we will know better what to do and mutual co-operation by all concerned will aid in placing Medford a contender for the highest score in following surveys," Mr. Austin declares.
