

Colorful Jaggat Singh, Hindu Grappler Meets Columbo Tonight

BIG ITALIAN DUE FOR TOUGH TIME IS FANS' BELIEF

Bewhiskered Wrestler Returns Here After Meeting Londos Recently—Hubka and Wade Round Out Card

Pull of his usual tricks and eager to add another scalp to his belt, distinctive Jaggat Singh, Hindu grappler, will appear at the Armory tonight against Casey Columbo of California, the old smoothie, in one bout of a two-oly card that promises no namby-pamby wrestling.

From his hand-bar mustache to the bottoms of his non-ticklish feet, the colorful Hindu is the most unusual wrestler ever to appear in Medford, as fans who saw him here several months ago will agree. His actions fit his appearance, for he wrestles unlike any other grip and grin artist.

After giving Champion Jim Londos a stiff battle recently in Seattle, Singh has headquartered for several weeks in Portland, where he has centered the spotlight on more than one big-time card. Wrestling may have its colorful foreigners, but this poker-faced Hindu is probably the most outstanding.

Tough One for Casey. Casey Columbo, fans' figure, is in for a tough time of it, but this powerful youngster believes in knocking them over one at a time in his rapid climb to stardom, and asks what a Hindu got that he hasn't? It is granted that Singh has the edge in experience, but Columbo, a local favorite, has proved several times that he is as clever as many of the leading old-timers. He is counting on his unusual strength and stamina to beat the Hindu, knowing that he will be equalled if not bettered in one important point—speed.

Glen Wade, highly-touted newcomer, will mix grips in the other half of the card with Joe Hubka, Czechoslovakian who developed into an outstanding athlete by playing football at University of Nebraska, and who, since the took up professional wrestling, is considered one of the fastest heavyweights in the country.

Wade, too, has centered his activities in the northwest recently, winning acclaim wherever he tugged and tussled. He is an all-around good wrestler, the kind that has no shortcomings and is well-nigh impossible to stop when he gets his dander up.

Action Promised. This match should see plenty of action and speed in itself, and drawing as much attention as the other half of the program, as Hubka has one of the largest followings that ever became attached to a wrestler locally.

Promoter Lillard is looking for a sell-out on the card, which he feels fortunate in securing. Ray Pringle, fireman, is working up enthusiasm himself, over prospects of acting as referee.

GASOLINE SALES TAX TOPS PREVIOUS YEAR

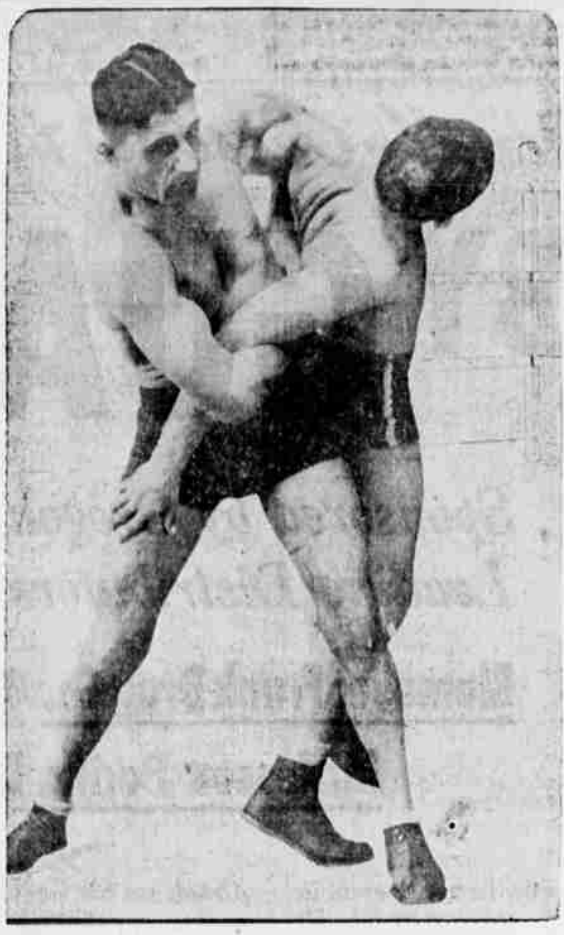

Sacramento, Seattle and Hollywood were tied for third place in the Pacific Coast league today, with Oakland pushing Los Angeles hard for the lead.

The Acorns took the second of a three-game series from the San Francisco Missions 5 to 3 yesterday, boosting their average to .837. Second baseman Freddie Miller knocked out two singles and a homer in four times at bat to drive in four Oakland tallies. Willie Ludolph, Oak pitcher, held the Reds to five hits, while Walter Beck allowed eight.

The Angels made it one game each in their series with Seattle by winning 8 to 3.

Ted Norbet and Les Powers crossed the plate in the ninth to enable the San Francisco Seals to come from behind and take a 10-to-9 victory over Portland. In four times at bat, Norbet scored three times, once with a homer and the other times on a double and a single. Joe Di Maggio drove a homer over the left field wall in the second.

With Archie Campbell allowing Sacramento only five hits, Hollywood won 4 to 1. Chick Ellsworth, Solon shortstop, was spiked in the instep by George Myatt, and as a result may be out of the game for several days.

Boston, center of baseball interest during the winter, apparently has no intention of relinquishing the spotlight now that the 1935 season is under way.

When the curtain rose Tuesday it was Babe Ruth and the Braves who held the center of the stage. Yesterday it was the Red Sox, who indicated in no uncertain terms that they are out to get into the pennant fight as they turned back the New York Yankees for the second time in succession.

Tangling in another mound duel, the Red Sox won, 4-3, in the 10th inning.

With President Roosevelt throwing out the first ball and remaining through the game to bring good luck, Washington's Senators trounced the Athletics, 4 to 2, before 21,000 customers.

Before a crowd of 24,000 the champion Detroit Tigers lost their first game to the rebuilt Chicago White Sox, 7 to 6. Zeke Bonura smacked two doubles and a single.

The Cincinnati Reds, who lost their opener, gave the Pirates a taste of their own medicine by moving on to Pittsburgh and taking a 7 to 4 decision before 10,000 opening day fans.

Cold weather stopped the New York-Boston, Brooklyn-Philadelphia and St. Louis-Chicago contests in the National league. Cleveland and St. Louis in the American were rained out.

COAST SWORDSMAN KEEPS CHAMPIONSHIP

NEW YORK, April 18.—(AP) Helen Mayer, representing the Los Angeles Athletic club, has won the women's national fencing championship for the second consecutive year.

The blonde German 1928 Olympic champion successfully defended her crown last night, winning her five final bouts without a single setback and with only eight touches scored against her.

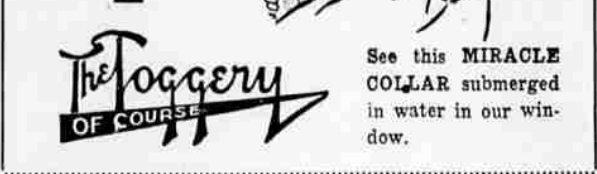
