DOCTOR SUES PARIS FOR RIOT INJURIES

PARIS (UP)—A French surgeon, Dr. Jean Bouchon, who was injured seriously in the riots which occurred in February of 1934, has filed suit against the city.

On February 6, Bouchon was summoned to a cafe in the rue Royale to give aid to the injured. He remained at the disposition of Bonnevoy-Sibour, who was prefect of the Seine at the time, from 7:30 until after midnight. As he was leaving the cafe he was drawn into a crowd of rioters and was swept on with them to the Place de la Concorde. Here in the fighting that ensued, Bouchon was injured seriously.

Unable to continue in the medical profession as he has been confined in a hospital since he was injured, Bouchon has engaged a lawyer to get financial recompense.

CANCER SCOURGE END PREDICTED BY MAYO

SAN DIEGO, Cal. (UP)—Dr. W. J. Mayo, one of the two famous Mayo brothers of Rochester, Minn., predicted here that "the day is not far distant when there will be no fear of cancer."

"Less than 10 per cent of American people are susceptible to cancer, and of these only a very small percentage ever contract it. It is with these that we are working," he said.

"American medical science has made some rapid strides toward control of cancer, and sooner than many suspect will have it whipped just as medical science whipped typhoid fever."

BUTTER AND EGGS UNCHANGED TODAY

PORTLAND, April 18 (AP)—There was no change in price on butter or butterfat during the late session of the produce exchange.

The better weather all along the coast is creating in spots a surplus of butter which as yet has not become burdensome because of the delayed season east of the Rockies.

Market for eggs continued to reflect strength at the recent advance in the selling price. Buyers were not generally quoting a higher price.

Last minute advance in buying prices on live chickens for the Easter trade was showing here with killers offering 14 1/2 to 15 lb. for light Leghorns and a cent more for medium stuff.

Further lift in dressed turkey prices were shown here with a resumption of the demand. Buyers were offering up to 23 lb. for both hens and toms of fancy grade but few of the latter were available.
