

RESURRECTION IS BEACON FOR MAN ASSERTS PASTOR

Speaking Sunday night at the Church of the Nazarene on the topic, "The Glory of Christ's Resurrection Triumph," Fred M. Weatherford, pastor evangelist, used as his text, John 14:19, "Because I live, ye shall live also." In brief his message follows:

"Easter is the climax of 4000 years of divine economy in an effort to refashion the spiritual mold of mankind. Easter was the voice of prophecy to demonstrate its fulfillment."

"All the sacred annals of heaven's library were opened to the reading world when Calvary's tomb yielded its prey. If the resurrection revelation of Christ is not actual history, there is no history. That day inserted a brilliant marker in the catalogue of the Christian dead and extends to the living an ever-lighted beacon to direct its steps out of darkness and spiritual decay. It bridges the gap across the transcendent scenes of time to a world gilded with immortal glory and imperishable duration. The resurrection is the seal of Christ's claim—I am the Resurrection and the Life. It gives an unmitigated assurance to faith in His promise 'Because I live, ye shall live also.'"

"The resurrection is Christ's seal bringing to a glorious consummation His completed plan of redemption. It bestows a new and glorious life. Man is a sinner and needs pardon. He is unpurified in heart and needs cleansing."

"The whole prophetic and gospel fabric is so interlaced with resurrection truth as to make it inseparable to the plan of divine revelation. New Testament writers alone make nearly one hundred references to this cardinal truth."

"Christ's bodily resurrection is the benediction of God, placing His divine seal of approval upon Calvary's sacrifice, to open up a provisory heaven, where men may come with their certificates of faith and realize upon the eternal values extended them in a redemption that holds for an inexhaustible duration. Our sins committed us to the devil's paw. Christ came to pay the ransom with His own blood and buy us back to God."

"But the cross did not hold Christ. The grave with all the skill of human wit, genius and military power could not hold Him. Immortality cannot be confined. The stupidity of man is revealed when he attempts to evict the certainty of a resurrection, for every man, 'Because I live, ye shall live also,' are the words of Him who became the first fruits of them that slept. "Off the robe of sin with its certain and ultimate defeat. Come with your certificate of faith and cash in on the promissory note of God."

Several hands were lifted for prayer.

JULIAN DAILY TAKEN TO STATE PRISON BY DEPUTY HERB MOORE

Julian Daily, 23, under a five-year sentence in state prison for conviction of participation in the DeVoe store robbery last May, in which shots were exchanged with city police who surprised burglars in the store, was taken to the penitentiary yesterday in custody of Deputy Sheriff Herb Moore.

It was Daily's third visit to the "big house," and according to his attorney and county officials, the youth realizes the seriousness of his predicament and has changed his attitude towards organized society. One more felony conviction and he will come under the Oregon habitual criminal act, and face a mandatory life term. The sheriff's office reports that Daily, during his county jail incarceration, plotted escape and was kept under close surveillance.

Glenn Tremaine and Lealie (Big) Wilson, the latter a former Ashland youth, stand indicted in this county for burglary. They are at large, and authorities claim they were members of the gang that committed several local crimes. The remainder of the group are either serving prison terms or are under suspended sentences. The gang robbed DeVoe's, Huson's "What Not," the Junior high school, the senior high school, the Bungelow store, and entered a number of local places during a wave of crime two years ago. Last October the robbery of Mann's Department store led to arrest of the band.
