213 CCC RECRUITS ON SPECIAL TRAIN

A special train from Port Sheridan, Ill. brought 113 new CCC members for Camp Rand and 100 for Oregon Caves camp, Wednesday, Lieut. Fred W. Green of Medford district headquarters met the train at Grants Pass and supervised the unloading of the recruits.

Another special train will arrive on Thursday from Fort McArthur, Cal., with 74 men for Oak Knoll, 24 men for Yreka, 97 men for Indian Creek and 125 men for Evans Creek.

EDWIN TARGET FOR HEAVY FIRE FROM SOLINSKY COUNSEL

Investigator. He admitted that in his first confession he tried to shift the blame to Davidson. He later agreed that he was engaged in the reputed conspiracy before Davidson became a party to the enterprise.

The government sought to show today that Solinsky and Edwin had practiced reputed frauds in 1930, prior to the 1932 frauds alleged in the indictment. Federal Judge Fee ruled against the admissibility of such evidence. Hugh L. Biggs for the government said the government proposed to show that Solinsky and Edwin carried off a \$200,000 payroll as laborers at Medford on the payroll of defense counsel, George Neuner, defense counsel, argued that such testimony did not show intent to defraud, if in fact the government received the equipment.

Hint No Cola Kept
It was indicated in the arguments that the defense proposes to show that Solinsky allowed irregular accounting procedures at the park but that all funds irregularly processed were spent for park equipment and that Solinsky's only error was his zeal to improve the park. Davidson testified yesterday that he received \$785 for building a boat for use on Crater Lake and that the total cost was \$1235. The same boat, completely equipped, sells for \$4400, he testified, indicating that Solinsky "got a good buy for the government," even if payrolls were padded to obtain the money for which no appropriation was available when the launch was constructed.
