

# NAVY BILL SETS PEACETIME MARK FOR UNCLE SAM

### House Appropriations Committee Cuts 15 Million Off Estimates to Quiet Fears of Other Nations

WASHINGTON, April 24.—(AP)—An admission that the cost of building an American navy up to treaty strength "must be disturbing to us and equally disquieting to other powers" was sounded Tuesday by the house appropriations committee in laying before that chamber one of the largest peacetime naval appropriation bills in history.

The committee chose this language to explain its action in reducing by almost \$15,000,000 budget estimates of requirements for the beginning of new ship construction.

It called attention to demands for even more rigid limitation of naval armaments than is provided by the Washington treaty which expires in 1936—by asserting:

"Should Seek Limitation  
"It would seem that continued limitation and some contraction of tonnage now permitted must be the wish of all educated, unselfish people of the world over."

The total of \$459,523,791 provided by the measure for the fiscal year was \$172,980,629 larger than the \$286,543,162 appropriations for 1935, although \$27,637,596 under budget figures.

The administration asked for \$29,380,000 to start laying down 24 new ships for replacing present vessels and looking to a treaty navy of under age ships by 1942. The committee halved this amount but reported to the house that "if, for reasons deemed to outweigh those here advanced, the administration should elect not to defer the construction of such ships, there is nothing in the bill to hinder that course."

Might Need More Funds  
It pointed out, however, that a supplemental appropriation probably would be necessary early in the next session in this event.

"However much we may be deter-

mined to live up to the letter and spirit of that tent of the United States naval policy which reads: "To create, maintain, and operate a navy second to none and in conformity with treaty provisions," the fact remains that the present estimate cost must be disturbing to us and must be equally disquieting to other 'treaty navy' powers," the committee cautioned.

"Another (naval) conference will be held during the present calendar year. The committee's proposal to have the estimate for additional new constructions is offered with the thought that the administration might wish to defer the commencement of such construction until that conference shall have been concluded. Such a course should be interpreted as an expression of our faith and confidence that the principle of limitation will survive and that out of such conference a new and better accord will be soon."

### Fight Over Construction

The administration program had called for starting in 1936 one aircraft carrier, two light cruisers, three destroyers over 1,500 tons, 12 destroyers under 1,500 tons and six submarines. A bitter committee fight was understood to have centered around the new construction plan.

The committee explained it also trimmed budget estimates for naval aviation from \$2,000,000 to \$45,500,000, but said the actual reduction amounted only to \$3,704,400 because of a transfer of the naval reserve appropriation incident to the aviation cadet program and the substitution with the approval of the bureau of aeronautics of a contract authorization for new planes.

Although it did not specify the number of new aeroplanes to be built in 1936, the committee said it was expected to have 150 more in operation during 1936 than the present 1,193.

An 11,000 increase in navy enlisted strength as contained in budget estimates was provided in the bill. This would bring the complement on larger ships from 80 to 85 per cent, provide crews for more ships and increase the aviation personnel. Present appropriations look to a naval enlisted force of 82,500 at the end of the 1935 year.

# HUGE IRRIGATION PLAN FAVORED IN SNAKE RIVER AREA

### Reclamation Officials Recommend \$4,600,000 for New Program; Surveying Crews Seeking Dam Site

WASHINGTON, April 24.—(AP)—A \$4,600,000 irrigation program, involving construction on the Black canyon and north fork of the Snake River projects in Idaho, has been recommended by the bureau of reclamation for development under the new public works program.

While such recommendations do not necessarily mean that money will be allocated to the projects, it was said reliably that reclamation officials look on the works so recommended as being ideal, not only for providing immediate work to men now on relief, but as permanent developments of the country involved.

### Storage Dam Proposed

It was learned by the Associated Press today that the recommendations include \$2,000,000 for the second unit of the Boise-Payette project, commonly known as the Black Canyon development, near Caldwell, \$2,000,000 for construction of a storage dam on the north fork of the Snake river and \$600,000 for surveys.

Under the latter item comprehensive surveys preliminary to obtaining a supplementary water supply for the Boise valley is contemplated, it was said. It includes a survey of possibilities of storage of surplus water of the Payette river in Garden valley, also the possibilities of the so-called Salmon river diversion, Twin Springs and other Boise valley sources.

In addition, a further survey of the Teton river on the north fork of the Snake, and also on the south fork of the latter stream will be made if the recommendations of the bureau are followed by officials who will allocate the funds.

Surveyors at Work  
Surveying crews now are at work endeavoring to find a suitable dam site on the Teton river, and Representative Clark (D., Idaho) predicted today that adequate sites will be found on both the Teton and south fork of the Snake within a short time.

"When this is accomplished," Clark said, "I have every reason to believe that approximately \$2,000,000 will be

recommended for construction on the Teton and possibly other millions of dollars for work on the south fork.

The Idaho congressional delegation is preparing a program calling for the expenditure of about \$6,500,000 for the development of springs and wells and the construction of dams and reservoirs on small rivers and streams for irrigation purposes throughout the state.

# MORE POPULATION FOR WILLAMETTE VALLEY OBJECTIVE

### PORTLAND, Ore., April 24.—(AP)—A program to make the Willamette valley capable of supporting thousands of more families was set in motion here Tuesday by Governor Charles H. Martin's Willamette valley project committee and the state planning board.

Representative Douglas McKay, former Salem mayor, was elected chairman of the Willamette valley project committee, which includes Multnomah, Marion, Polk, Linn, Lane, Washington, Yamhill, Benton, Clackamas and Columbia counties.

John Thornburg of Forest Grove was named vice-chairman, and R. H. Kipp of Portland, secretary.

"When more of the land of the Willamette valley is put into shape, 100,000 additional persons can live there without congestion," declared Martin. "There is room for 37,000 more families, many of whom are coming from the drought-stricken areas."

"Holland and the Willamette valley are about the same size, and yet Holland has a population of 8,000,000 and the Willamette valley but 600,000, including Portland."

Plans were formulated to set up projects within the valley with which to get government aid.

# SHIFTING SANDS PERIL PASTURES IN CLATSOP

# GERMANY HAS BIG WAR CHEST ABROAD, CLAIM

### PARIS, France, April 24.—(AP)—A dispatch published by the Agence Economique et Financiere from London today asserts that Germany has placed a minimum of 500,000,000 pounds abroad for use as "a war chest."

The statement, attributed to "a well-known London exchange broker," said the funds were placed principally in the United States, Sweden and Holland, and that the reich now is drawing on the fund to buy raw materials for rearmament.

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
