

CALYX SPRAY FOR PEARS, APPLES TO BE APPLIED SOON

Time to apply the calyx spray on pear and apple trees for the control of codling moth worms will soon be here and growers are advised by L. G. Genter of the Southern Oregon Experiment station and L. P. Wilcox, county agent, to be prepared and apply this important spray at the proper time.

In case of apples the spray should go on when 80 to 85 per cent of the flower petals have fallen and before the calyx cups close. The object of this spray is to fill the blossom end of the young fruit with poison so that worms trying to make their entry at that point later during the season will be killed.

This calyx spray on apples is of great importance and should be applied at the proper time. The calyx cups of apples close within a week after the fall of flower petals and when once closed no amount of spraying will give the necessary protection at this point.

In pear orchards where worms have been a serious problem a calyx spray is advisable and recommended, especially on the Bartlett variety. Bartlett's are now shedding their petals and within the next week or ten days, sprays should be applied. The application of sprays at this time will also prevent damage from such leaf and fruit eating insects as sawfly larvae, fruit worms and canker worms.

Where a scab spray program is being followed, the arsenate of lead may be combined with the lime sulfur or wettable sulfur as the case may be.

Use powdered arsenate of lead at the rate of three pounds to the one hundred gallons of water. Apply

There has been considerable campus agitation over the bill, which provides for the payment of \$15 a year by students for fees.

SALLEE IS HELD FOR GRAND JURY IN HECTIC QUIZ

Wilkins alleged that the deputy district attorney was instrumental in preventing Sallee's wife from testifying at the trial. Nelson replied in vivid terms, attacking the veracity of Attorney Wilkins. Later both lawyers apologized to the court.

The tension was heightened yesterday when Attorney Wilkins subpoenaed state witnesses, and the district attorney charged, "this was a fishing expedition to try and find out the state's whole case." Attorney Wilkins held that the defense was entitled to all evidence collected by the state. Deputy Nelson contended that all the state was required to do under the law, was "to present a prima facie case, indicating the apparent guilt of the defendant." No denial was made that the state's entire case had not been presented.

There was also considerable fevered quibbling over technical points of law.

Sallee was charged with luring the little girl, in his auto, to a spot on Bear creek. Sallee was positively identified by the little miss as her attacker. The defense produced evidence in an attempt to show that Sallee was elsewhere at the time of the crime.

Both attorneys in their arguments characterized the crime as "heinous."

BATES GETS MINE SUBJECT TO LIENS

Circuit Judge H. D. Norton this morning signed the decree in the Black Channel mine litigation, giving to F. A. Bates and wife proprietary rights in the property, subject to payment of liens held by the Robinson interests, amounting to \$1886; \$176 Jackson county taxes, and a mortgage held by Peter Lund and wife, for \$5400. The decree is in accordance with an opinion handed down by the court ten days ago.

Included in the obligations are sums for labor incurred when L. A. Banks, former local agitator, serving life in state prison for murder, headed operations at the mine. Much of the Banks-Pehl inspired turmoil in this county centered around the property and its owner, resulting in scores "breakdown of law and order" charges.

In the proceedings now terminated, Bates was represented by Attorney George W. Nelson, the Lunds by Attorney T. J. Enright, and other litigants by Attorney L. M. Carl of Albany, Ore., and Attorney W. M. Briggs of Ashland.
