

I. O. O. F. OF VALLEY TO MARK FOUNDING AT JOINT MEETING

Odd Fellows and Rebekahs of the Rogue River valley will meet at Central Point Friday evening, April 26, to commemorate founding of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows in America. One hundred and sixteen years ago Thomas Wilsey and his associates met in Baltimore, Md., and formed an organization, establishing the American jurisdiction independent of what was known in England as the Manchester Unity.

In all countries in the United States and Canada members of the order will meet Friday to commemorate the occasion and to pay homage to the founder of the organization. Ashland, Central Point, Gold Hill, Jacksonville and Medford have joined together for the event, and committees have been working to the end that those attending will be well repaid for the effort. Central Point lodge will be host for the evening, and has secured the Grange hall for the banquet and entertainment. Supper will be served in the large dining hall and will start promptly at 6 o'clock, and those in charge of the kitchen and dining room will carry on in relays until all have been served. PIERCE DECLARES STRAW BALLOT IS FULL OF DANGER

WASHINGTON, April 25.—(AP)—Straw ballots and bandwagon votes, says Representative Pierce (D., Ore.), are growing evils which threaten to prevent a fair tryout for the American form of government.

He so told the house postoffice committee, when he asked it to approve his bill making it unlawful to use the mails for straw ballots.

Pierce ought to know the effect of such things on politics, for he told the committee he had "been in the political game 49 years, and a candidate 15 times."

The former governor of Oregon asserted that a magazine poll in 1924 "materially increased the Coolidge vote," and in 1932 "added to the Roosevelt strength."

"When these straw votes are taken," he said, "the people begin to distrust them. They say, 'we're licked.' Therefore, they don't take any interest in the election, and they don't vote."

"We must always remember the straw ballot is very easy of manipulation. The boxes may be stuffed, or the ballots sent out to a selected group. The result is to start a bandwagon movement."

"The success or failure of our young kind of government depends on the honesty and integrity of its elections. And one of the greatest evils affecting that is the straw ballot."

Witchcraft Cure For Flu Is Cause Of Three Deaths

CORUNNA, Spain, April 25.—(P)—Two women and two men were held on murder charges today following the deaths of three brothers as the result of the alleged practice of witchcraft for the cure of influenza.

Police claim the two couples induced the three brothers, who were ill with influenza, to submit to strange rites, including suspension in a river at midnight. The three brothers died of pneumonia.

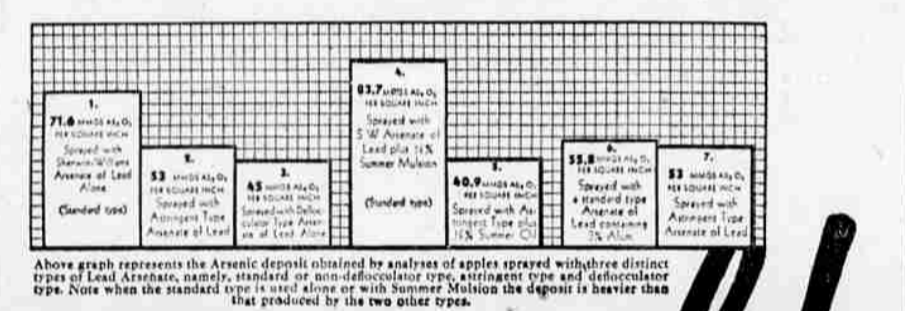
Cop's Outing Upheld.
