

Wade-Cistoldi Grapple Tonight Promises Display of Fireworks

ITALIAN BOASTS BOTH SKILL AND ROUGH TECHNIQUE

One match of clean, fast wrestling and another match of more blood-thirsty home bending are scheduled for the weekly grapple and grapple show tonight at the armory, and both promise so much action and color that Promoter Mack Lillard is going to flip a coin to decide which bout is staged first. For the convenience of those fans who attend the Chamber of Commerce banquet, the 10-minute opener will not start until 8:45, and the main matches until 9.

For those fans who like their wrestling tinged with temper, the bout between Glen Wade, his grapple from Winslow, Neb., and Angelo Cistoldi, 215-pound newcomer from Italy, should provide what it takes. Promoter Lillard, who returned from a trip to Portland last night, said he talked with the big Italian and found that he is confident of mopping up the mat with Wade.

Cistoldi is a new face in Medford, coming here from the Atlantic coast with a reputation for great skill and roughness. It has been some time since local fans have had a chance to see a real meanie in action and they are looking forward to Cistoldi's appearance.

Wade, rated as one of the big-time grapplers of the coast, went over with a bang when he made his first appearance here last week and impressed the fans he is no slouch. He is rough when necessary, and is feeling in fine fettle for the onslaught of the Italian tonight.

"Iron Man" Joe Hubka, popular football player from University of Nebraska, has been matched in the other half of the show against big Jim Healy of San Francisco, another clean, well-liked muscle man. Hubka, who lost his bout here last week with Wade when he tumbled through the ropes and injured his back so painfully that he was unable to continue the bout, has recuperated from his bruises and promises a whirlwind performance tonight. There has never been a wrestler who has gained a larger local following than Hubka, and indications at that fans will turn out by the score to see him in action against the stocky, pugna-cious San Franciscan.

Fireman Ray Frieble will referee both tussles.

(By the Associated Press) A year ago the Chicago White Sox, rebuilt at considerable expense, looked as if they might go somewhere, but they finished at the bottom of the American league. This spring they have begun to make threatening gestures, particularly at the champion Detroit Tigers. The pale hose have taken four out of five decisions from Detroit for a total record of five victories in eight starts.

Whitehead, who made his big league debut last week by limiting the champions to six hits, cut that figure in half yesterday to win 10-4. Fay Thomas, a "recruit" with a good bit of previous major league experience, turned in a four hit game for the Browns and lost it 3-2 to Cleveland when he forced in the odd run in the ninth with his seventh strike.

Fine pitching also marked the other National league contests. Van Mungo pitched the Dodgers to a 4-1 triumph over the Phillies. Hal Schuchmacher, the Giants' big right hander, limited the ruthless Braves to three hits, losing a shutout by Les Malton's ninth inning homer and knocking in one run himself. The Babe failed to start because of a slight cold and struck out later in a brief appearance as a pinch batsman.

Lon Warlick rang up his third straight triumph for the Cubs, going ten innings to beat the Cards 7-6.
