Curry county planning committee on the proposal to develop the recreational and scenic resources of that county. The six who are accompanying the executives are Arthur McMahon, chairman of the state liquor control commission, R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, J. M. Devera, J. N. Bishop and C. B. McCollough, all of the highway department, and W. L. Gosselin, secretary to the governor. Henry F. Cabell, chairman of the state highway commission, who also had planned to take the trip, sent to San Francisco today by plane, accompanying his wife part way on her journey to Japan.

After meeting with the Curry county group Saturday at Gold Beach, the governor will address a banquet of the Oregon coast highway association at Marshfield. On the return trip, a short visit will be made Sunday at Redmond. According to a dispatch from Salem, the move to develop the resources of Curry county was launched by the state planning board at its meeting Tuesday and the governor took eight to take charge of the work locally in that district and to meet with the executive Saturday.

equipment needed in opening roads to Crater Lake. The government appropriation carried provisions for renting the snowplow equipment. The officials of the snowplow company offered to apply the rent on the purchase price of the tractor and plow, but no money was available for completion of the transaction. Solinsky's attorneys contend he felt it was better business to apply the revenue from payroll to the purchase price of the equipment, thus obtaining it for the government, than to continue renting the snowplow season after season.
