a successor was a matter that rested with the extension service. The county judge intimated that it might be several weeks before a successor was selected.
Mr. Wilcox said: "I feel by resigning I will better my position and enlarge the scope of my work. At the same time I will be able to reside in the Rogue River valley."
"Naturally the S. O. S. company is delighted to secure the services of Mr. Wilcox," Leonard Carpenter, one of the directors of the concern, said today. "We are in the unique position of being the only co-operative shippers and packers here, and we are constantly on the lookout for any method of helping the valley growers. In this move we are giving Mr. Wilcox a free hand to tackle the cull pile. We don't want second grade and cull pears, and our whole organization is set to eliminate them where they should be eliminated, and that is before they are grown."
S. M. Tuttle, manager of the S. O. S., said:
"Mr. Wilcox will be valuable as technician in charge of the production of fruit. This phase includes cover crops, moisture, spraying, pruning, thinning, soil moisture work and, in fact, every phase of orchard activity. The fruit growers of the valley are in for a battle with every other district in the world that produces fruit of any variety, and only those who produce and sell the best variety will survive."
"Mr. Wilcox wants all the local growers to know that he is still interested in their problems and will be glad to see and consult with them in his new office."

ALIENATION CASE APPROACHES JURY

PORTLAND, April 26.—(AP)—The action in which M. A. Hollingworth of Portland seeks damages of \$20,000 from George Kincaid of Klamath Falls for alleged alienation of the affections of his ex-wife, Helen, now the wife of Kincaid, was to go to the jury late today in Circuit Judge Tucker's court.
Closing arguments of attorneys were started yesterday afternoon and were resumed this morning. They were to be completed about mid-afternoon, after which Judge Tucker was to instruct the jury on the law before it retired.
Defense attorneys argued that Hollingworth's wife lost her affections for him before she met Kincaid. They declared that Hollingworth was now trying to recover damages from Kincaid for "stealing affections which did not exist."
The senator said that he believed regulations for handling loans of this type from the new works relief program will be out within a few days.
"It is anticipated that the per cent of grants may be increased and that the interest rates, presently maintained at four per cent, may be reduced," Senator Steiwer said.
Steiwer said that the language of the new public works act would permit a federal grant for the entire project and would not require that it be self-liquidating.
"On account of the debt limitation of the Oregon constitution, I suggest that you apply for a grant for the entire amount necessary immediately," the senator telegraphed Oregon.

SIX DEPARTMENTS OBTAIN SHELTER

SALEM, Ore., April 26.—(AP)—Restoring a semblance of order out of the confusion caused by the burning of the state capitol building last night, state departmental heads today announced temporary locations for six of the main departments of state government as follows:
Governor's Office—With the public utilities department in the state office building.
Treasurer's Office—Ladd & Bush bank.
State Police—At Salem city police headquarters.
Liquor Commission—Oregon building in downtown Salem.
Labor Commissioner — With state industrial accident department in the state office building.
State Land Board—in the basement of Senator Charles Spaulding's home across the street from the burned capitol building.
Locations for other departments have not yet been determined.

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6 NEW FEDERAL JAILS JUSTICE DEPT. PLEA

WASHINGTON, April 26.—(AP)—Attorney-General Cummings today said the justice department had asked nearly \$4,000,000 of public works funds for erection of six new federal jails.
These are planned in Kentucky, Minnesota, Arkansas, Montana, Texas and California. The cost is estimated at from \$100,000 to \$425,000 each.
