

SPARKS FROM THE FIRE

Income taxpayers may or may not be "dunned" again as the result of the fire which last night destroyed the state capital building. The tax commissioners stated their records of who paid were in the vault, but they do not dare open it for at least a week.

But in the mean time, the tax commission will not be housed, since there is nothing to house. The only things saved, other than what may have been rescued in a vault not too secure, were personal records and brief cases. The fire produced so much smoke in the building to permit very much salvage.

U. S. Government Aids Students At U. Of O

The state capital today looked like a busy railroad terminal. Everybody asking where everybody else might be, with no adequate answer. No sooner do the parties locate the governor's office in the public utilities department in the state office building, than it moves to the supreme court library across the street. This was also true in other incidents.

Twenty-one hours after the fire started in the basement of the famous old capitol building, flames were still bursting forth and firemen never left the place. Streams of water, at one time pouncing as high as from 50 hose down to fire were constantly played upon the ever-continuing flames.

The cause of the fire may never be known, state police officials stated they were looking for any possible clues to incendiary origin, but at a

late hour this afternoon had not found a clue.

The burning of the state capitol, when the famous copper dome nodded its head in a final farewell to the pioneers of the state, was a beautiful sight. The flames—yellow, green and blue—melded in perfect harmony, lit up the sky for miles around just before the ancient landmark for thousands of people hid its head in the grasping arms of the demon of fire.

The building that burned during the night was 80 years of age. The first unit was authorized by the legislature of 1872 (at that time held in September of the even-numbered years) but was not completed until 1875. The copper dome was completed 18 years later.

Among the losses charged against posterity were the oil paintings of the former governors of the state and territory. These were hung in the house and senate chambers, and the governor was about to make some changes. The painting of Julius L. Meier, the most recent governor, had not yet been completed. His will probably be the first to appear in the new capitol building—if and when.

The governor's office was the last on the second floor to catch fire, but it also made the brightest blaze. Those who contended this may have been due to the hue of the governor's secretary's hair had not been apprized the red-headed young man had accompanied the governor on his trip south.

Uncle Sam won out in the fire yesterday, so stated Dan Fry, state purchasing agent. Late yesterday afternoon he purchased \$400 worth of stamps. They were not rescued.

At noon the day preceding the fire Secretary of State Earl Snell denounced the fact the ways and means committee of the state legislature had vetoed the proposal to shine the capitol dome. The need for worry on that score has been ended.
